

From the Headmaster



It has been a fabulous term at Whanganui Collegiate School, and it is always a pleasure to write to our community. The School is in great heart and we have continued to see excellence across all facets of School life.

We hosted our first Round Square Conference in December 2023 that saw over 200 students and teachers from all

corners of the globe attend WCS. This year we will have a delegation attending the conference in Calgary, Canada, and more conferences and exchanges are being put in place this year. A very exciting time for our students and their opportunities in developing global citizenship. Further to that, our Cricket exchange programme with Scarborough College, UK, is now in full swing, with two students, Nathan Valentine, and Shaquan Belle from Scarborough with us for Term 1. WCS Year 11 students, Charlie Mabin and Hamish Cranstone, are now in Scarborough for the summer term. Exceptional opportunities ahead.

The changes to NCEA gave us the opportunity to look at our academic programme, last year we were accredited as a Cambridge School. All Year 11s sit IGCSE – and we are thrilled with its challenges and opportunities. Teachers and students alike are enjoying the challenges.

During 2023, we looked strategically at our sport – we are now committed to excellence in coaching with new directors for Cricket, Rugby, Hockey, Netball and Rowing, with others to come, and the future of WCS Sport is bright. This year we will look at other co-curricular areas of music, drama and debating in pursuit of the same excellence.

Through this first term we have put WCS through a rigorous accreditation with the Boarding Schools Association of the UK, to align ourselves with best practice in boarding schools. WCS will be the first school in NZ to be accredited.

Global Membership of Round Square, Cambridge International Accreditation, BSA International Boarding accreditation means that WCS will have International accreditation in Character Education, Academics and Boarding. Whanganui Collegiate School will be the only School in NZ to have all three – our School is a flagship and leader in Education.

As Headmaster I am honoured to share our vision for the future of philanthropy and its profound impact on our School. Philanthropy is not merely an act of giving; it is an embodiment of shared values, collective responsibility, and a commitment to fostering positive change in our community and beyond.

To that end we have engaged in a strategy to develop our buildings and programmes for future generations. Our new buildings are a wonderful example of honouring the past in order to provide for the future. Educators are increasingly aware of the interaction between physical spaces and learning environments. Modern facilities improve not only the School's physical environment but also its learning culture. Now is the time to ensure the School thrives at the same high levels for generations to come.

College and School Boards Report

On behalf of both Boards, a warm welcome to all of our Whanganui Collegiate School community, particularly those families and staff new in 2024.

The School continues to thrive under the Headmaster's leadership and staff. Our roll is strong for this year in both domestic and international students, and enrolment numbers for 2025 are already up based on past years.

With the School year well underway we already have much to celebrate in terms of student achievement in the academic, sporting and cultural areas.

Our academic results in 2023 were strong compared to the national figures of generally declining results. The success of this is due to our academic staff and we thank them for the dedication they show in developing the programme and in supporting our students. We are particularly excited about the introduction this year of the IGCSE Cambridge Curriculum for Year 11.

In January our students were already on the sporting field with a senior squad of cricketers completing an undefeated tour of Victoria and Tasmania. Our rowers were in camp preparing for the season-defining regattas, culminating in one of the most successful NZSS (Maadi Cup) regatta results in many years.

In debating, music and performing arts our students all continue to strive for excellence, and we look forward to our Performance Choir participating in July in the World Choir Games in Auckland.

The College Board recently held a strategic planning day which included a full tour of all the School's facilities. It remains essential that as respective Chairs, we continue to ensure that both Boards work closely together and adhere to our Two Boards – One School approach, strategically and operationally. A key focus that emerged was our need to develop financial resiliency. There is ongoing work in examining how we achieve this.

We have set out strategic priorities as a School and have outlined some key ones below – the 2024 School Strategic Direction is available on our website.


- Continue to articulate our purpose and direction as a Special Character and Round Square Global School and the first-choice co-educational boarding and day school in New Zealand.

- Continuation, review and further development of a rich, rigorous, and accessible co-curricular programme that strives for excellence, achievement and lifelong wellbeing.
- Ensure WCS continues to provide a high performing learning environment that fosters a positive, innovative and collaborative workplace that attracts, develops and supports all staff.
- Review the quality and condition of facilities to maintain a high standard of accommodation, recreational, and teaching facilities.
- Implement a campus wide approach to property management and Health and Safety
- Develop our philanthropic approach, as highlighted in the Headmaster's article.

In May we will farewell three long serving College Board Trustees - Mr Guy Pierce (Chair), Mr Chris Fallows (Chair of the Property Committee) and Mr Craig McKinnon, (Chair of the Finance Committee). Coming from a family with a history at Whanganui Collegiate School, it was always my school of choice; my great grandfather Edward attended from 1931-1934; my grandfather Les from 1957-1961; and my father Mike from 1988-1991. Many of our extended family have also attended the School.

FINDING BEAUTY IN OUR EVERYDAY LIVES

As we began our year in the Chapel I reflected on important messages to pass on to our students and introduced to them the idea of 'finding beauty in their everyday lives'. I shared that beauty is valuable because it helps us to transcend the mundane and ordinary to experience hope. Confucius taught that "Everything has beauty, but not everyone sees it." He said that the spiritual person knows that seeing it is the task of a lifetime and the reward of a life well-lived and in balance. I also argued that God is the source of and inspiration for beauty.

Earlier this year I made sure to attend the New Zealand Opera School performance in our Chapel. I found the beauty of the music by the composer Haydn utterly transporting. Beauty experienced in this way seems to connect me to a sense of the eternal and awakens for me a sense of God as all connected and all encompassing. As an artist and a theologian, beauty has been a theme that I have long pursued in my spirituality for its role to uplift and transform lives.

I reminded our students that beauty is found in many things such as nature, music, art, singing and spiritual ritual etc, but it is also found in the pursuit of excellence. Beauty can be found in sport such as when one watches the fluid motion of a great opening bowler for cricket or when I recall my mother watching the Wimbledon tennis every year and commenting on the beauty of a great tennis match.




It is found in that moment when our lives are lifted above the mundane or the ordinary. Therefore, I thought it important to encourage our students to recognise and pursue beauty as an essential aspect of their spirituality and future well-being.

This term has gone quickly and on Sunday 17 March we held a service for the Old Boys and Girls attending the 2001-10 Leavers Reunion. Last year we had the welcome intrusion of 'Missy' the cat and this year right on cue, a fantail (piwakawaka) threatened to upstage me in the service. I am starting to see a most interesting pattern emerge almost as if our ancestors longed to remain a part of our worshipping community.

Sadly, this is my last Bulletin and as I say my farewells, I feel a great sense of gratitude for the community that I have come to know and value, and for all that I have received. I leave Whanganui Collegiate School very pleased to have been the Chaplain here since October 2019. My new role is with the Wellington Cathedral of St Paul as the Canon Precentor, where I will continue my contribution to the Anglican Church.






World Choir Games

Feature Story

Hamilton Logan (H 1938-42)



Legging it for Charities - aiming to walk 100 kilometres in his 100th Year.

Hawke's Bay farming identity Hamilton Logan has kickstarted his very own 'Second Chance at Life' Fund with the Hawke's Bay Foundation, in the hope of creating a perpetually sustainable funding stream for three of his chosen charities. Hamilton has selected: Hawke's Bay's Rescue Helicopter, St John Ambulance and the Rural Support Trust for his own personal reasons – they relate closely to the community in which he has worked, operate not just locally but also outside of his home region and save lives everyday, both young and old.

He's inviting other community-minded locals to safeguard their lifesaving services by donating to the fund, and to join him on his walks at the Village Green in Havelock North.

"I was inspired by Captain Tom Moore and what he did in raising a huge sum of money for charity in England on his 100th birthday. New Zealand is a small place and I thought 'If I can still walk and think at 99, I can do that too'.

As a sheep, beef and cropping farmer, meat industry leader and Hawke's Bay's oldest living Magpie Rugby player, Hamilton recalls some instances over the

years that he himself has required the assistance of St John Ambulance. One when a member of his staff was electrocuted and the other when his own nose was broken in a game of rugby only to be straightened on the sideline and sent back out onto the field.

Hamilton, or 'Hammie' as he's affectionately known, wants to ensure that that help continues. Already past the halfway mark, Hamilton has clocked over 50 kilometres since 1 January and aims to 'knock the rest off his bucket list' before turning 100 in November. He admits he has no idea what day he will complete it, it'll be weather and health permitting.

"I've been walking around the streets near where I live but I hope to have the odd walk in the Village Green in Havelock North so that other people can join me."

Hamilton laughs at the analogy of being a 'Provincial Pied Piper' but admits he does have a few pearls of wisdom to share.

"When I was six, Hawke's Bay endured a trifecta of disasters; a world depression, the worst drought in a century and a devastating earthquake. A bit like Cyclone Gabrielle, these things were an enormous leveller, the days of luxury and overindulgence disappeared overnight.

"But keeping an attitude of always concentrating on the positives, not the negatives has helped me through, along with what I call a 'pause button'. If I'm blindsided or feeling lost, I pause, and I think and I reason the answer instead of walking around in circles. I encourage people to pause when they feel overwhelmed, and to discard anything that doesn't serve them well. It may even save your life or prompt a different direction."

As for how he plans to see in his 100th, Hamilton's keen to keep it low-key.

"I don't believe in getting ahead of myself but if I do get to a hundred, I will certainly enjoy it!"

For many, the idea of being philanthropic is achievable only through their wills once they're gone, but choosing to give while he lives has been a great source of joy for Hamilton.

"Life is for the living. It's the most precious possession we have. I get such a kick out of seeing people get some relief or benefit out of something I've done for them, and I want to be around to celebrate that with them. If what I'm doing only saves one life then it's all been worthwhile."

Museum & Archives

Visit on 3 March by Dr Peter Saunders, Great-Grandson of George R Saunders, third WCS Headmaster (1878–81)

Speech introducing Dr Peter Saunders to the School:

'For the Sake of the Black and Blue' - a line of the School song - but how did those colours of Black and Blue originate?

The answer is - from our guest's great-grandfather George Richard Saunders – the School's third Headmaster, 1878- 81, whose portrait hangs third from the left in the Headmasters' Gallery.

George Saunders came to Whanganui having attended Gonville

and Caius College at Cambridge University in England. He served as assistant master at WCS for a time before being appointed Headmaster in 1878 aged just 24 - very young for a Headmaster, and with

his assistant master George Anson also in his twenties it was, according to history, a fun School to be at.

Saunders was a very keen and capable sportsman and it was he that really emphasised the importance of sport in the School, initially athletics, cricket, football (rugby) and swimming. He instilled in the boys the manner in which sport should be played, resulting in a culture of fair play and good sportsmanship.

He was also a keen racing man and trained his horse 'Tricotrin' at School. When the local races were on he would take the boarders along for the day.

While here in Whanganui George Saunders married Miss Jessie Imlay and it was she who noted that with sport now being well established, the School needed colours and suggested that her husband's racing colours of Black and Blue - which incidentally had been the colours of his beloved Gonville & Caius College at Cambridge - be given to the School. And so it was 145 years ago that the School's pride in the Black and Blue was established.



In 1880 Saunders also gave the School its first trophy, still competed for today. It was awarded for Steeple Chase, now called Cross Country, and features the School's original motto "Finis Coronat Opus" (The End Crowns the Work). It is also the first known use of the Bishop's Mitre as a crest, now worn proudly on WCS sporting uniforms.

In 1883 George Saunders with his wife Jessie left the School, returning to England to complete his medical and surgical training at Cambridge and St Bartholomews Hospital (which incidentally celebrated its 900th anniversary last year).

He then returned to Whanganui in 1890 as Dr Saunders, serving the Whanganui community well and also sent his two sons to the School. His grandson - Alec Imlay Saunders, our guest's father - also attended in 1934-35.

In 1890 Dr G R Saunders donated three further cups, one of which he had won for Swimming at Cambridge University in 1871.



Today his great-grandson Dr Peter Saunders is here to donate four further trophies also won by his great-grandfather at various athletics sport - namely:

- The Caius College – Half-mile (800M) race of 1871
- The United Hospitals' Sports – 100 yds won in 1875
- St Bartholomews Hospital Sports – 220 yds won in 1884
- St John's College Oxford - Strangers Race of 1874

Not only did G R Saunders leave his mark on the School by having established a culture of sport and giving his colours, he also left his mark on the city, as when the Imlay family subdivided the Balgownie Estate he named the suburb Gonville and a number of the streets after Colleges of his old university. What's more with School and the Old Boys' Rugby Club being founding clubs of the Whanganui Rugby Union, the colours of Black and Blue with just the addition of a white stripe were adopted as the local Whanganui Rugby Union's colours, and are still in use today.

Dr George Saunders died in Whanganui in 1904 aged just 50.

Our guest is also a doctor. Having studied at Otago Medical School he went on to become an anaesthetist working in London, both in the NHS hospitals and in private practice, including St Bartholomew's where both his great-grandfather and great-great-grandfather had practised.




Old Boy Feature

Andrew Donald (Hy 1971-75) seems to The Bulletin to be the only 'actual' Whanganui All Black not yet inducted into the Whanganui Sports Hall of Fame. Three All Blacks before Andrew are inductees as are two Old Boys, Lord Arthur Porritt (DB/G 1914-18) for athletics and Harry Cave (G 1937-40) for cricket and although the Sports Hall of Fame has had interruptions due to Covid, this might be Andrew's year!

This outstanding halfback retired in 1987 but not before he had played 168 first class games which included eight All Black tests between 1981 and 1984 and another 12 tour games, 118 games for Whanganui, 30 games for the UK Barbarians, NZ Cavaliers, Saracens and other XVs, and numerous games for his club, Ohakune. Andrew was one of Whanganui's best representing his province with pride between 1976-87

and then battling some of the very best All Black halfbacks Dave Loveridge, Mark Donaldson and later fellow WCS school mate David Kirk (G 1974-78) for the All Black half position. Whilst farming, he continued to play club and rep rugby in Whanganui, but the rugby experts at that time said that by not moving to the bigger provinces and remaining true to Whanganui, he probably sacrificed a longer All Black career. After captaining the 1st XV in 1975 and earning massive praise as halfback from coach Jim Wallace, Andrew then did it all the hard way by playing for NZ Colts, NZ Juniors, North Island and the traditional All Black trials until he was rewarded with selection for the 1981 All Black tour of France and Romania.



Two years later and with Dave Loveridge unavailable, Andrew won the top spot in a team which also included the younger David Kirk. He continued into 1984 by playing the home series against France and later toured Australia and Fiji. By 1985 Loveridge had returned and Andrew wasn't selected but when Kirk withdrew from the 1986 Cavaliers tour of South Africa, Andrew joined the team maintaining his form into 1987 to the extent that he was a distinct possibility of taking the black jersey for the inaugural World Cup. It wasn't to be and Andrew subsequently retired but his size and his passing and running skills were all part of a massive contribution made to all the teams he represented in such outstanding fashion. Andrew and Gaye were later able to bask in the joy of having two outstanding scholastic and sporting daughters attend WCS, Georgia (B 2006-10, Head Girl) and Harriet (B 2009-13).

is currently principal of Ebbett Park School, a primary school of 175 students which Kate

describes as “the hidden gem of Hastings”. She graduated from Massey University with a Bachelor of Education and prior to her current role, has been Deputy Principal of Mayfair School also in Hastings and Principal of Tutira School, a small rural school between Napier and Wairoa. Ebbett Park School has many deaf and hard-of-hearing students, and because of this, the school has worked really hard at promoting sign language within their curriculum. Kate says that “deafness is not seen as anything different” with sign language being normalised as an everyday practice allowing students and teachers to greet each other through signs.

Joe Faram (H 1978-81) was the subject in



Bulletin #82 of a story around Cyclone Gabrielle. Recently there has been a sequel to one of

the many rescues he and his helicopter crew carried out in February 2023. There were many stories of his heroic efforts but one was overlooked, perhaps because it didn't involve a human life. Many who read the Hawke's Bay and national press will recall the stark images of a miniature horse stranded on a roof

during the flooding in Pakowhai which was later reported as having died. However, in a recent breakfast news TV interview, Joe revealed that three days after he had first seen the stranded pony, he decided to rescue Poppy from the pile of debris and apple boxes which surrounded her. Having gained the confidence of the pony and plied her with apples, he used his belt to lead her through the piles of slash and silt to relative safety. One year later, Joe appeared on the breakfast programme in an endeavour to seek the fate of that pony. In a short time the Williams family were in contact with the TV channel and Joe and Poppy were reunited in a 'live cross' to Poppy's stable. The owner of the pony put the rescue down to the bond created between the stricken animal and Joe who was able to tick off another dramatic rescue. However, this one actually brought an emotional closure to Joe after twelve months of wondering about the horse's fate and finally being able to reunite with Poppy and her loving family. A heartwarming story indeed!

Ruth (nee Ashford) Gallagher (B/Gw 2002-05) has joined the staff of her old



School as a Teacher of Art. After gaining Academic Distinction with Honours in Computer Graphic Design, Ruth worked for one

of the country's leading design agencies, working on several national and international accounts. Deciding to pursue Art education, Ruth gained a Post Graduate Diploma in Secondary Teaching and moved to London, where she worked in secondary schools in the South West boroughs. For the last four years she has worked at Marlborough College in Malaysia, as both Teacher of Art and as Head of Art and Design. There she oversaw International art exhibitions at the Australian High Commission in Singapore, led Ivy league University tours to the U.S and U.K, and in her downtime enjoyed travelling throughout Southeast Asia. Ruth's ability to be innovative, use initiative and creativity in meeting the needs of students, and her enthusiasm and passion for teaching Art will bring a fresh perspective to the WCS Art Department.

Finnegan Murphy (G 2016-20) was



successful in winning the U23 category at the New Zealand Cycle Classic, a four day

tour through the Wairarapa. The Classic finished on the 5th day with the Wellington Criterium, consisting of a 1.6km circuit round the Golden Mile of Lambton Quay. The individual overall classification saw Finn finish an extremely creditable 8th over approximately 350kms. Finn's father **Ian (G 1987-91)** reports that since leaving school Finn has been at the University of Canterbury where he has been doing a BCom majoring in road cycling with minors in economics and finance!

Training rides of 5-6 hours are not unheard as part of his season and race preparation. This has enabled Finn to follow his passion for cycling including undertaking a number of events with some success.

The Cycle Classic and the 7-day Tour of Southland are NZ's two premier stage races and Finn has now completed three Southland Tours with a best finish of 6th in the U23 category. This bodes well for plans to head to France in mid-2024 (once the degree is finished) and test himself against what Europe has to offer. The amateur cycling set-up in Europe is next level and it's the place to give it a go. As Ian is quick to point out it's a hard road to 'make it' as a professional cyclist so the focus is on Finn enjoying each step of the journey, which he's doing, and ultimately reaching his potential – and where that takes him, who knows! Finn was recently awarded a Mitre 10 Whanganui Future Champions Trust award and has been accepted to race for the French Cycling Club Morlaix Cyclisme Performance (MCP) based in Brittany.

Georgina Duncan (Gw 2015-18) a



longtime showjumper and skilled equestrian rider has now become a highly competitive and talented polo player in the oldest of equestrian sports. In early February Georgie was selected for New Zealand in a Trans-Tasman clash at the Festival of Polo at Mystery Creek near Hamilton. To be selected to represent one's country is a real honour and especially experiencing the passion of matches against the old foe, Australia. New Zealand came away with the victory in this tough fought Trans-Tasman match

winning 5-3 in the final chukka. Further honours have come Georgie's way as she has now been selected for the New Zealand Ladies team to play Australia in NSW in mid April.

Martin Pennefather (P 1977-81)



has been selected for "the trip of a lifetime" as part of the New Zealand Over-60s team that will line up against thirteen others for the Over-60s Cricket World Cup in Chennai, India. All players took part in a provincial tournament and from that week, a national side was selected. He's only just 'ticked' over 60, so it helps that he's a budding young 60-year-old as he puts it! Martin's team has to play nine games in two and a half weeks, so they need to be cricket-fit even at this level. Martin has played club cricket in Whanganui for the United Club for the past 40 years and represented Whanganui in the late 1990s and early 2000s. He was also part of the national Over-50s squad in 2018. He said his reasons for playing for so long came down to the love of the game and the camaraderie and, regardless of which part of the world the teams came from, they were of a similar ilk - "die-hard, tragic cricket players".

Rowley Powdrell (S 1959-62)



is the 4th generation to live in the Wairoa homestead built in 1874, while the 6th generation are on the wider family property. Sadly, Rowley and his wife Lorraine were forced out of their home due to Cyclone Gabrielle and have

only recently been able to return to their restored property situated a few kilometres west of Wairoa. The river rose over the highway to flood the homestead but not before Rowley was able to move out plenty of furniture. Although he considered Cyclone Bola worse in some ways, it was the silt that Gabrielle left behind that caused most problems with the power of the water so strong that it sucked away eight cord of stored firewood. Rowley spent last winter digging the silt out of his property but has had to sow grass straight into the silt. Throughout this summer, he has continued the long days of clean-up but as he says, "there's no use sitting back, you've just got to get stuck in"!

George Beamish (Hy 2012-14) smashed



the New Zealand 5000m record and dipped below the Olympic Entry Standard mark by recording a stunning 13:04.33 for fourth at the John Thomas Terrier Classic at Boston University in January this year. (Also prominent in that meeting was **Liam Back (G 2017-19)** who ran his third sub four minute mile 3:59.41 at the same John Terrier Classic.) Geordie's performance ensures he has a second Olympic entry standard mark for the 2024 Paris Olympics after he achieved the feat in the steeplechase during a stellar 2023. Although Geordie said his main goal was to run the steeplechase in Paris (Bulletin #83 reported on this race in Budapest), he has further stunned the athletics world by winning Gold in the 1500m at the World Indoor Athletics Championships in Glasgow in early March. He was deep in the field through most of the race



being 10th at the 500m mark, 9th after 800m and still 8th with 500m to go. But he always backs his trademark finishing kick, and on the boards in Glasgow it delivered the finest result of his career as he strode home in splendid style for New Zealand's first world indoors track gold, albeit a race he considers a little short for where his career goals lie. Geordie was still pinching himself long into the Glasgow evening as he contemplated the extent of the feat he had just managed in becoming a world athletics champion over the iconic 1500 metres, the first track gold for New Zealand in the history of the global meet. He rounded off a great Championship for New Zealand which finished third on the medal table with two golds and two silvers.

Kat Austin (B/Gw 1999-03) former WCS Club Captain and current Athletics New Zealand High Performance Athlete Support Manager and **Scott Newman (P 1983-87)** Athletics New Zealand High Performance Director, were also both part of the strong New Zealand team.



Simon Walker (Hy 1970-74) recalls watching Harvey Old Boy, the late **Simon Dickie (Hy 1964-68)** and his eight win gold at the Munich Olympics in 1972. Inspired by that feat Simon became a Maadi Cup winning crew member himself in 1974 and after a gap of many years due to farming and family, he has made a triumphant return to the sport by being selected by World Rowing as one of 20 Umpires to officiate at the 2024 Paris Olympic Games. He started that return to rowing in 2009 when he became an International Umpire and has since officiated at more than 20 international regattas, including the Senior World Championships in Serbia and the World Master Championships in South African last September. Simon describes the Olympic Games "as good as it gets and is the icing on the cake for a rowing umpire".

John Wells (H 1952-54), Jeremy Wells (H 1958-61), Amanda Wells (Gw 1991-92) and Geoff Wells (H 1989-93)



have all been involved with Rotorua based Kilwell Sports, one of the country's more innovative and iconic companies which last year celebrated its 90th year of business. After 56 years leading the company Jeremy, said his late father John L Wells would be immensely proud that the business is still family-run. However, it was time for Jeremy to retire and hand the reins to Geoff and Amanda who are now 3rd generation co-owners. The average amount of time a staff member worked with Kilwell Sports is 20 years and Amanda said that she and Geoff were both "incredibly proud of the company's longevity and to have so many loyal staff wanting to work with the business". Amanda added that longevity comes down to good ideas and innovative individuals who are willing to push the barrow. Rotorua Mayor Tania Tapsell paid tribute to the 3rd generation business and how important it has been to the city to have an adventure and fishing brand all of which is surrounded by lakes.

Richard Burke (S 1984-88) son of **Tim (S 1952-56 Head of House)**, is Chief



Executive of major grower, LeaderBrand, one of New Zealand's most progressive horticultural businesses. He has been with the company in excess of 30 years, starting as a tractor driver after returning from overseas. Gisborne sweetcorn is a pre-eminent source of food and LeaderBrand is one of the largest growers in the country and is now at the end of a long season that started prior to Christmas. Richard described the last growing season as "crappy" when he was in a war with the weather he is happy to see the back of last year. His team handpick the harvest and pre-orders for the nation's supermarkets went crazy for the famous locally grown sweetcorn.


David Wells (Hy 1968-72) is a



Whanganui kiwifruit grower and co-owns the Ngaturi orchard in Mangamahu. The orchard started in 1978 with 3.5ha of vines and by 2020 had expanded to 20ha in a region not especially known for kiwifruit growing. The orchard is in a microclimate with cool winters and hot summers but David wanted to better understand those conditions and a couple of years ago installed a Harvest Weather Station providing him with real-time weather information. That information provided him with decision making abilities on irrigation, frost protection and how to protect his vines from the bacterial disease Psa. David added that the technology is constantly improving and the data from his orchard was used as part of a project by Zespri to assist in making a difference for other orchardists.

He is currently Chair of the Whanganui Rural Community Board which carries out powers delegated to it by the Whanganui District Council.

Andy Lowe (H 1975-78) and his family own and run the Lowe Corporation, a meat and by-products industry founded by his late father, Graeme in 1964. Lowe Corporation



is also a major sponsor of the Hawke's Bay Helicopter Rescue Service. In 2004 Andy and his wife Liz discovered that the bush on the peninsula of their Ocean Beach wilderness property was not only silent but also eroding, with predator species rife. This led to a vision he created with well-known expertise, to provide a privately owned and funded 'mainland island' conservation project embraced and co-funded by the late Julian Robertson. With pest control and habitat restoration 'Cape Sanctuary' had facilitated the translocation of many endangered species back to the peninsula. It is a world leader in conservation innovation. Andy was recognised for being the driving force behind this project by becoming a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit (MNZM) for services to conservation.

Matt Holden (H 1981-85) is on a mission



to improve the mental health of people living in rural communities and as a result, he has created 'Mates of Mates for Mates'. Matt was inspired by a simple press-ups challenge during the 2020 lockdowns and then just three years

later the devastating Hawke's Bay floods gave him first-hand experiences of overcoming those challenges. In November last year Matt hosted the inaugural event, an occasion which brought many rural folk together with much good food, laughter, shared experiences and, of course, lots of push-ups! Advice was given wisely from now 99 year old **Hamilton Logan (Hy 1938-42)**, a survivor of both the 1931 earthquake and the 1938 Esk Valley flood, and who completed his pearls of wisdom with the words "the most precious thing we have been given is life, and life is for living". Every dollar raised at this event was gifted to the Hawke's Bay Rural Support Trust with whom **David Todd (G 1978-82 Head Prefect)** is involved. Future editions of The Bulletin will feature more of Matt and Hamilton's involvement around Mates of Mates for Mates. Hamilton's utter determination for his cause has seen him pledge to walk 100kms in the year of his 100th birthday (he has already walked 40kms) and he has given the name of his campaign, 'Second Chance at Life'. He has chosen the following three charities to which folk are able to donate to in order to give people that second chance at life.

Those charities are St John, Hawke's Bay Rescue Helicopter Trust and the Rural Support Trust which are all connected with saving lives both young and old.

Cam McLeay (Gn 1976-80 Head Prefect)



and his wife Kate have opened a holistic health and wellness retreat about 20 minutes' drive from Havelock North, set

on 16 acres of gardens with sweeping ocean views at Waimarama. Cam, who also has a role with Mates of Mates for Mates, has called his picturesque homestead 'Cape South'. It was once an old doctor's surgery in Waipawa, which was moved to the site and tripled in size from its beginnings dating back to 1903. Cam has led an incredibly active life involving adventures all around the world, including rafting expeditions on the planet's wildest rivers, over a dozen documentary films, solo mountainbiking across Africa, climbing the Matterhorn and surviving attacks from aggressive hippos, Nile crocodiles and even an armed ambush from rebel militia. He has also personally guided the Prince of Wales, Joanna Lumley, Jeremy Clarkson and offered adventure training to elite British military troops as well as private-guiding some of the world's wealthiest people on their super-yachts. The Head Prefect role clearly prepared Cam well for what lay ahead of him in his later years!

Jeremy Cullwick (G 1992-96)



Jeremy Cullwick grew up on Tapahia, a sheep and beef farm consisting of three blocks in Flemington, Central Hawke's Bay. Son of **Tim Cullwick (G 1959-63)** and grandson of **Selwyn Cullwick (G 1919-21)**, Jeremy featured on Country Calendar with his wife, Kate on the family farm 30 minutes south of Waipukurau. Before moving to Tapahia, Jeremy and Kate worked as practicing vets in Dannevirke before moving to the family farm purchased by Tim nearly 50 years previously. Entrepreneurs Kate and her sister Prue resolved to make use of the



wool from the fleeces to release an organic flax linen and lambswool bedding range, the combination of which together with running Tapahia and the resulting business success, has enabled Tim and Kate to buy Kate's Gisborne family farm plus Waimata Angus. A talented family showcasing the best of the family farm.

Phoebe Collier (Gw 2016-20) at the recent New Zealand Rowing Championships won gold medals in the Womens Senior Coxless Four, Womens Senior Coxed Eight and Womens Senior Pair and silvers in the Womens Premier Coxless Pair, Womens Premier Coxless Four and Womens Premier Coxed Eight. In the same National Championships, **Matthew Poulton (H 2019-22)** won gold in the Mens Coxed Eight.

Waqar Nalaga (Hy 2020-21) after a



season with the Manawatu NPC team, was selected recently to play his first Super Rugby Pacific game for the Fijian Drua. **Pita Manamanaivalu (H 2022-23)** also played a prominent role for the Hurricanes U20 team in the Super Rugby U20 Tournament in Taupo and **Josh Brunger (Hy 2018-22 Head Boy)** played for the Chiefs U20 team having come off a debut season in the Whanganui Heartland rugby team.

And to add to the considerable recent successes of young Old Boys on the rugby field, **Harry Godfrey (S 2016-20)**



continues to impress the rugby critics with his fine performances from fullback in the Hurricanes Super Rugby, **Adam Lennox (G 2016-20)**, has 'scored' a couple of trips to Borneo and Hong Kong in between working hard with the Super Rugby Pacific Chiefs wider training squad. The first was with the NZ Cavaliers 7s team who won the Borneo 7s at the Eagles Rugby Club in Sandakan, Malaysia and then a successful tournament with the Shogun RFC winning the Hong Kong FC Cup 10s.

Konradd Newland (Hy 2020-22) has been named in the New Zealand Rugby Under 20s World Championship Squad. Konradd, Harry and Adam recently played each other in the Hurricanes Hunters v Chiefs Taua, with the Hurricanes winning 25-19.

Her passion for the sheep industry stemmed from any early age and as they say it is in her DNA.



In memory of her brother **George Ellis (H 2006-10)**, tragically lost in 2014, Olivia has undertaken philanthropic efforts by organising charity balls. These events have collectively raised over \$30,000 in support of the Lowe Corporation Rescue Helicopter (Hawke's Bay) and the Canterbury Westpac Rescue Helicopter.

Kate Baddeley (Gw 2013-17 Head of House) decided in March last year to

In November, 24 hrs after returning from Bali, Kate was now under starters orders for the Lake Taupo Cycle Challenge! Racing into rain and head winds the majority of the way, she was very happy to finish an especially gruelling race in a time of 7hr 18mins.

But this was just the warmup – with the third event nine days later, she was happy going into it because she knew she could complete all three components and it was just a matter of putting all three together. Though it sounded easy it was anything but. However, after a swim and a “not so smooth” bike ride, Kate got to experience a pretty cool feeling after completing the Half Marathon and crossing the finish line in 6hr 24mins knowing she could officially call herself an Ironman.

Other WCS alumni who competed in the half Ironman were **Sophie Collins (Gw 2011-15)**, **Jack McLeod (G 2012-16)**, **Charlotte Gillespie (Gw 2016-20)** and **Daniel McLeod (Hy 2011-15)**. Jack competed to raise money for Parkinson’s NZ and was able to contribute approximately \$4000 to the cause.

Next the Kinloch Triathlon, which on a freezing cold day with huge wind gusts and rough water provided a real challenge for Kate. With safety boats being bounced around and marker buoys taken out, the race was shortened to 200 metres and even then many were pulled from the water. Kate prevailed

with a time of 2hr 30mins. Lastly, the Across the Lake swim, the 4.3km swim from Acacia Bay to Wharewaka was a long and lonely affair and she kept saying to herself that the only way out was to keep swimming! Her time was 1hr 40mins.

Six days later came the big finale...the Full Ironman in which Old Boy **Ben Kelt (H 2014-18)** also competed. Another windy day was to test the athletes, in the swim, 80 competitors were pulled from the race and although the tail wind to Reporoa on the bike leg was great, the return leg to Taupo into a strong head wind could only be summed up as brutal. Kate describes dismounting from the bike as bittersweet, thoughts quickly move to the Marathon. As gruelling it was and after many hours of pain, the joy of crossing the finish line and the subsequent emotions mixed with relief were, in Kate’s words indescribable. Congratulations Kate on a magnificent Tri season.

Robert Cashmore (Hy 2001-04) went to



Telford before heading to Australia to work at a quarry. He joined the NZ Army in 2008, moved to the UK in 2009 and joined the Royal Marine Commandos and was deployed to Nadi Ali, North Helmond province, Afghanistan in 2011 and trained as a sniper in 2013. Jamie Gaddum (H 1993-97)





OBITUARIES



Alan Cooper (G 1950-53) was born in Gisborne in 1935 and died at home in Whanganui on 12 February 2024. Awarded a scholarship to attend Whanganui Collegiate School he was a House Prefect in Grey House. Alan graduated with a Bachelor of Arts from Victoria University and a Bachelor of Education from Massey University with a Diploma in Teaching at Palmerston North Teachers' College. In the 1960s he had his first stint at Whanganui Collegiate School and during this period he also taught at St George's School, Gisborne Boys' High School, Scots College, Porirua College and Palmerston North Boys' High School as part of his early teaching years. He returned to Whanganui Collegiate School to become the first Housemaster of Porritt House in 1971.

Alan continued his development in educational leadership in being appointed as the Deputy Principal of Lindisfarne College in Hastings and the Headmaster of Hadlow Preparatory School in Masterton.

He also served in the education branch of the NZ Army and earned the rank of Major in the territorials.

Alan was appointed Headmaster at St George's School in 1982, before retiring in 1999, and led the school to international acclaim during his time.

Alan was progressive but never lost sight of the value of old-fashioned virtues, the importance of students' understanding and demonstrating loyalty, responsibility, pride, and discipline. He knew students needed to be taught how to think, to reason and to solve problems, allied of course with good work habits but also that students developed and learned differently and one model did not fit all.

He supported both the teachers and students at St George's to develop the skills required to bring this type of learning to the fore. Alan also knew just how important it was that students learn how to handle responsibility.

His belief that sport was important to learning was demonstrated in the huge amount of out-of-hours' time he dedicated to many sports through his time teaching, but also post-retirement, particularly in cricket and rugby. He was always very proud to represent the School at both rugby and cricket in the first teams.

Brought up in a small community, just outside Gisborne, and with the school reinforcing this, his service to community through many other areas than just teaching and sport was a big part of his life, giving many hours of support, leadership and mentoring for others – even up until his final days.

In his retirement he was involved in distance learning and more than 100 of his journal articles have been published in New Zealand and overseas. He was highly respected by educational leaders.

He was always an advocate of St George's School and with his hugely supportive wife Margaret, they were always in attendance at our School events. Alan wore his St George's Honours Tie with pride.

As well as Margaret, he is survived by his four children Michael, Geoff, David (P 1985-89) and Eli (Gw 1996-97).

Adrian Cave (S 1949-51) was born in 1934 and died in Gisborne on 14 September 2023, aged 88. In 1946, the family bought Sunworth Station at Ngatapa close to Mangatoitoi Station where the Russell family farmed, and whose daughter Mary was later to marry Adrian. At School, together with his cousin **Peter Williams (H 1947-50)**, both boys pursued their interest in art, the start of an amazing career for each of them with Peter becoming an accomplished equine artist and Adrian also excelling with watercolours.



Unfortunately, aged 15 Adrian developed pneumonia and was brought back to Gisborne for his 5th form year, home-schooled by his mother and gained School Certificate on the back of a strong showing in art. After leaving school, Adrian farmed in the South Island which also included a spell of compulsory military training before he returned to work with his father and brother **Simon Cave (S 1950-54 Head of House)**. At a young farmers dance in the local hall, he met Mary, the 'girl next door'. Marrying Mary forced the sale of his pride and joy an MG TF - useful for attracting girls but subsequently surplus to requirements!

Adrian and Mary travelled extensively through Asia to Europe, marrying in London in front of friends and family, two of whom were priests, an Anglican and a Catholic and who both conducted the service. Having campervanned around Europe, the couple returned to farm Mangatoitoi. He doubled the size of the farm and additionally became Chairman of Mount View farms in Whanganui for many years. A bad back at aged 60 forced Adrian's retirement enabling him to return to his lifelong hobby of painting which proved to be an artistic bonus for the next three decades. Sons **Philip (S 1997-81 Head of House)** and **Chris Cave (S 1989-93 Head Boy)** formed a partnership and now jointly run the farm.

Adrian had painted in oils for ten years but he decided to experiment in watercolours. On many painting trips with fellow artists/teachers, they visited European countries - France, Spain, Italy (he found Venice fabulous to paint), Croatia and the Czech Republic. In the Far East, Vietnam was his favourite country. Eventually his profile as a watercolour painter led him to win Watercolour New Zealand's the People's Choice Award in 2014 and Supreme Award in 2015.

Adrian and Mary made many friends on their travels and those friends were always welcome back at the farm. Adrian loved a a good yarn and considered painting holidays as a good source of those yarns. Philip ended his eulogy with one of his father's favourite yarns. Adrian was sitting in a car with two mates, one being **Mark Irwin (G 1948-52 Head Prefect)** and the other **David Nolan (S 1949-52)** all discussing what they would do with their lives. Mark said he would be an All Black and a doctor and David said he would join the Navy. When they turned to Adrian, they told him he would just marry the girl next door to which Adrian replied that if he did marry, it would be only to the best! All three WCS schoolmates achieved their wishes!

Richard Izard, OBE CNZM (Hy 1948-50) Honours Tie holder and generous donor to the School passed away 2 January 2024, aged 89. Richard recently said he loved his time at WCS where he made life-long friendships, learnt self-discipline, courtesy, etiquette and ethics. He had the highest respect for Headmaster Frank Gilligan out of anyone he had ever come across. As much as Richard enjoyed School he was impatient to get on with life and wanted to leave School at 16. His father thought it a safe bet to allow him to leave on the condition he pass School Certificate, given Headmaster Frank Gilligan had informed him that he was at the bottom of the class and didn't have a hope of passing. This was red rag to a bull, so he decided to apply himself, and flew through!




Richard enjoyed racing cars and flying planes, but by the time he was 44, several business reversals had left him nearly broke. He found himself in America desperately selling sheepskin seat covers to the Californians from the boot of his Pontiac. From there, his fortunes improved. He returned to New Zealand in 1980 and with a combination of pig-headedness, ebullient charm, hard work, an eye for the main chance, luck and infusions of family help at crucial times, he developed a successful export manufacturing business in the small Northland town of Wellsford. He sold tungsten carbide tipped saw blades to the world and, against the odds, captured a significant slice of the valuable American home handyman market. Even at his peak, however, Richard was only one step ahead of the banks. After exiting the business at the right time in the early 1990s, he had gone on to become a significant New Zealand investor. The accumulation of wealth follows no set route, but Richard had the essential entrepreneurial attribute - desire - in large volume. However, there were long periods of drift, depression and desperation but he was fortunate to have in Patience Izard a supportive and practical wife throughout.

Richard was awarded the OBE in 1994, and CNZM in 2012. Whanganui Collegiate School is so fortunate to have had a benefactor such as Richard Izard who supported our School so generously. The Izard Sports Centre is named in his honour, the foundation stone for which was laid in 1994.



Ross Mathieson (S/M 1947-51) died in



March 2023 and featured in The Bulletin #80 as our first AFS Scholar. He was a generous donor to the School. The

following are excerpts from his daughter's (Shayne Mathieson) Eulogy.

Ross was minimally concerned about what others thought of him. Climbing over fences with signs saying "authorised entry only" appealed to Ross' sense of clear communication, his non-respect of authority and his sense of adventure – reasoning (1) that the sign didn't say **who** had to authorise you, in which case he had authorised himself, (2) he needed to know **why** would something be restricted entry and (3) that if one was big and strong enough to climb over the fence, then one was big and strong enough to deal with **what** was on the other side. Rules were only for those who can't think for themselves in Ross' book, including traffic lights!

Passionately interested in the calibre of the person, what they did and how they thought and acted, Ross was insatiably curious. His brain was breath-taking with a very extremely broad areas of knowledge. Ross did the Saturday Herald Quiz with his family every week. He had backstories to the questions for his family. The reason he knew the answers ranged from back to his days of being on his AFS adventure, to working on banana boats in the Pacific, to his natural instinct to talk to anyone he encountered by chance – for example Glenda Jackson, or Frederick Hundertwasser; or to his incredible network of friends, political connections

and business colleagues, or his world travels, or to his prodigious newspaper trawling, keeping up with what was happening around the globe.

Ross was a lifelong learner and made every attempt to speak the local language, whichever country he travelled to. When he reconnected with a Belgian friend from his AFS teenage days about 10 years ago, he took up learning French again. His reasoning that although her English was good it wasn't fair that she should always have to speak in his language, and he never in hers.

Ross was a guide and mentor; a financial underwriter, helped businesses get under way; supporter of many, discussing their business plans. If you weren't yet out of the education system, Ross would be deeply interested in what you were studying and your future plans, challenging your subject choices, but always fully supporting anyone's plans to travel, to explore, to experience life beyond the limits it may have had until this point.

Ross was privileged to create both length and depth in his life. The all-round sportsman, natural leader, loving brother, caring son, bon vivant, drain-layer, AI technician, caterer, IBM protégé, flower grower, incorrigible flirt, software company developer, space-invader, dreadful driver, insatiable knowledge seeker, do-it-yourself guy, wet right-winger – or maybe dry socialist(?), proud and loving father, grandfather and great-grandfather, the quick and humorous wit, time and motion man, traveller and explorer, Ode-ist supremo, lover, independent thinker, caring neighbour, farm adviser, behind-the-scenes political manipulator, dancer, generous host, implacable patient, organiser, numbers man, mentor, coach.

David Benjamin (G 1958-62) was born in



Auckland and attended King's Prep School before boarding at WCS. On leaving school he worked for

Wright Stephensons and Ra Ora Stud where his future in the thoroughbred industry was determined.

A stint at Sidehill Farm, Newmarket, UK followed, before Benji made one of the best decisions of his life taking a job at Claiborne Farm in Kentucky. It was there that he met Masey who happened to be working in bloodstock insurance. They married and, full of dreams and inspiration for a future, returned to New Zealand.

Benji was outstanding at designing farms, and reshaped the landscape at Blandford Lodge, Fieldhouse Stud, and his own Fayette Park. The trees on those properties will be just one of his legacies.

When it came to marketing he was innovative, often thinking outside the square and was definitely a leader when it came to promoting stallions and yearlings. He could be flamboyant in his fashion, and the pink and green Fayette Park marquee was a sight to behold at the Karaka sales.


He was an exceptional host both at the sales, on the farm or at his beloved Hahei beach house, a trait which could be attributed to his wicked sense of humour and his love to have a chat.

Benji was associated with some good stallions - Grosvenor, Prized, Stark South, Postponed, and Don Eduardo to name a few; and Fayette Park held the title of Breeder of the Year in 2003.

The thoroughbred world has lost one of its champions and the NZTBA a Life Member and one of its greatest supporters.




Gift in Will
