MICKY PEACOCK (HY 2020-24)

One of the things we keep coming back to is Micky's cheeky smile and wonderful sense of humour. The Year 13s fondly recall some of their high jinks in the dormitories and Micky was always in the thick of the action, including attempting to make hammocks in the rafters and other such mischief. A passionate fan of the NRL, Micky and others would be based in the Day Room throughout the season as they willed the Warriors to victory; he had the chance to meet his heroes in recent months. He was always great value around the House and formed warm and lasting friendships with everyone.

Micky was a very proud member of Harvey who represented the House with his trademark grit and determination. He particularly shone in the pool in House Swimming and was outstanding in javelin and discus at House Athletics. If he was unable to compete, he was always found on the sidelines and was one of our most vocal supporters when Harvey took the House Rugby title for the first time in 18 years. He got the chance to play alongside his brother, Jimmy, in last year's final and they formed two-thirds of a hard-hitting back row. Micky was also happy to step up whenever needed and was a member of our Part Song group in Year 9 who won the House Spirit Cup for their performance of 'Jailhouse Rock'.

Beyond the House, Micky was a superb sportsman who represented the School in Rugby, Hockey and Cricket. The feature image is a classic shot of Micky from the Winter terms as he was often running from one sport to the next. His biggest contribution was to the School's Cricket programme. He was part of the 1st XI from Year 11 and scored his maiden century against Scots College with an unbeaten 121. He was appointed Captain in 2023 and won praise for his calm and thoughtful leadership, both on and off the field.

Micky was a much loved member of our House and we are so proud of the character and positivity he demonstrated over the last eleven months - it was a real example to us all. We will miss his energy and liveliness up and down the corridors of Harvey; he will forever be in our hearts and minds.

This year Cambridge IGCSE at Whanganui Collegiate School has held particular significance. Cambridge reflects not only the academic rigour and global standards of our students but also their resilience and adaptability in a rapidly changing world. Cambridge is a cornerstone of our academic framework, fostering critical thinking, in-depth knowledge, and a global perspective all qualities that are essential for developing outstanding global citizens. Our Year 11 students have faced the challenges of preparing under the pressures of an evolving educational landscape, approaching the exams with determination and integrity. Their success is a testament to the strong academic foundation provided at WCS and their achievement in these examinations will set the stage for future endeavours, both academically and in the wider world.

Round Square continues to thrive, with our exchanges with Kinross Wolaroi School in NSW and junior students attending a conference in Canada. Three senior students are part of an international Round Square team of 60 students on two priority construction projects that will have long-lasting, positive impact on the environment and the local community in Hoa Binh Province in Vietnam.

We had our first Cricket exchange with Scarborough College UK, with Hamish Cranstone and Charlie Mabin attending the school in Yorkshire for a term. Next year we have other exchanges in the pipeline with Round Square schools including Gordonstoun School in Scotland. In December 2025 we will host our second international conference 'Journeys without limits: Uniting the world through adventure'. Exceptional opportunities for our students.

With our commitment to boarding excellence, in May this year Whanganui Collegiate School became the first school in New Zealand to be accredited under the Boarding Schools' Association (UK) International Boarding

Accreditation Scheme

Drawing upon the highly respected and well-established benchmarks of standards for boarding schools in the United Kingdom the BSA also reflects the huge diversity of schools globally.

Whanganui Collegiate School is now internationally accredited in three key areas: Character Education, Academics, and Boarding. We are the **only** school in New Zealand featuring all three, making Whanganui Collegiate School a leader in the New Zealand and global educational landscape.

May the God of light and life bring each family joy, peace, hope, and love this Christmas.





School Honours Tie Awards







Frances Gibbons (Staff 1989-2009)

Having retired in 2009 after 20 years' service as Librarian at WCS and also maintaining the School's website 2003-09, Frances was approached by the Chairman of the WCS Museum & Archives Trust to undertake the considerable task of cataloguing and digitising their holdings, in particular photographs, books, trophies and other items – starting in 2010, the task continues to this day. Links are then created to individual Old Boy & Girl names in the Register database, providing an invaluable visual record of their time at WCS.

Frances also handles research enquiries and assists in hosting families, visitors and tour groups. She also leads students' orientation to the School's history and heritage and provides access to resources for their assignments. That the Museum is recognised as a leader in its field is due in no small part to her expertise and enthusiasm when imparting to visitors a tangible experience of 170 years of WCS history.

The award of the Honours Tie and Brooch acknowledges exceptional service to the WCS Museum & Archives and to the wider School community.

Brad Scott (#9537 M 1990-93)

Brad Scott was in the All Whites v Oman and Malaysia in 2000, scoring a goal on debut. He was in the New Zealand Under 23 team 1998-2000 playing seventeen matches.

Brad was in the WCS Football 1st XI for three years before embarking on a professional football career. Over 11 years in New Zealand, Australia, Hong Kong and Indonesia he was a professional player.

He played in the National Soccer League in Australia for the Canberra Cosmos and the Football Kingz. He was a skilful striker, winning numerous Golden Boot awards at several clubs.

Michael Street (Staff 1975-2002)

Mr Michael (Mike) Street was awarded his WCS Honours Tie at the Football 50th Celebration held in May, for his contribution to the School and in particular Football.

Mike came from Sunderland, UK in 1975 started at WCS as Head of Department Classics. In 1976 he started coaching the Soccer 1st XI (1976-1989) and was Master in Charge of Soccer (1976-2002). He was a tutor in Grey and Empson and Housemaster of Marris. He taught Latin, Classical Studies and Greek. He is a Common Room Life Member.

His contribution to theatre and drama productions was also exceptional.



YEAR 11 STUDENT NATHAN YUE BRAIN AND NEUROLOGICAL SCIENCE

The New Zealand Brain Bee Challenge is a competition for Year 11 students funded by the Australasian Neuroscience Society, the aim of which is for students to learn about the brain and its functions, learn about neuroscience research, find out about careers in neuroscience and to dispel misconceptions about neurological and mental illnesses.

In Term 1 Nathan undertook extra study in the area of the Brain and Neurological Science. He was assessed on this material in Round 1 of the Brain Bee and made it through to Round 2, which required further study and another assessment.

Along with 175 students Nathan attended the Brain Bee Day in Auckland in the last week of Term 3 and took part in the team quiz.

His success in Round 2 resulted in him receiving an Internship for a day at the Centre for Brain Research at the University of Auckland Medical School.

Lighting Upgrade in the Prince Edward Auditorium


The Prince Edward Auditorium was opened in 1984 and was designed by Sir Miles Warren. The original Par Can lighting has been replaced with the assistance of a grant from the Four Regions Trust.

The new LX lights were installed in time for House Music in June. The new lights' head fixtures can be controlled and operated from the operations booth.

The LED lights consume much less power, leading to lower operational costs and are full colour. When programmed into a show, the fixtures can be pointed in different places depending on the requirements of the scene.

The new DMX controller is significantly easier for students and staff to learn and operate, therefore allowing the production team to spend more time creating the scenes.

The highlight of the event was an immersive journey down the Drive, where student artwork was animated and projected onto the surroundings, creating a breathtaking fusion of colour, light and movement.

The Year 12 and 13 Printmaking exhibition provided an interactive experience. Animated displays peeled back the layers of each print, offering a rare glimpse into the combination of creativity and technical skill that goes into printmaking.

A special moment was dedicated to recognising the achievements of Year 13 students. Over 45 students contributed to animations designed to fit seamlessly within the School's window frames.


A notable projection focused on the School's sporting history, exploring the dynamic balance between tradition and change.



Rebecca Scown (Gw 1999-2000)

Since we reported in May last year (Bulletin #82) on Rebecca's role as CEO of the London-based charity Youth Experience in Sport (YES) she has had a very eventful 18 months. With four other young New Zealanders living in the UK she was invited to attend the Coronation of King Charles III & Queen Camilla at Westminster Abbey in May 2023, and also to attend the Coronation Concert at Windsor the following day. She and her Kiwi friends were able to mingle with fellow guests at the Abbey and met a number of well-known celebrities such as Emma Thompson and Andrew Lloyd Webber.

A recent article on Newsroom [link] has a very readable and enlightening interview with Rebecca in which she outlines some of her experiences with YES, and events she has attended, including the Royal Garden Party at Buckingham Palace in May.

Typically modest, what Rebecca does not say in the article is that in February this year she was selected as one of five finalists in the UK New Zealander of the Year award.

This annual prestigious award from The New Zealand Society (UK) has been won in the past by such notable New Zealanders as Dame Kiri Te Kanawa, Sir Don McKinnon, Sir Mark Todd and Alexandra, Lady Smith - wife of Sir Lockwood, and former WCS counsellor (as Alexandra Lang) 1999-2003.

Her nomination reads:

Rebecca Scown for growing the influence and impact of YES and other charities focused on youth and sport in the UK as well as co-founding TIMA, a digital sports platform for grassroots sport in the UK. Rebecca has been leading and coordinating numerous fundraising events for YES including charity runs and also CEO Sleepout.

Rebecca has represented New Zealand at high profile events such as King Charles III Coronation, Rowing Regattas, and other internationally recognised sporting events in UK and Europe. Continually supporting Kea and other NZ Society aligned communities in the UK.

The award was presented at the annual Waitangi Day Charity Ball at the Waldorf Hotel and although she did not win, it was reported that the calibre of the

nominees this year was so high that they chose five finalists when normally there would only be two or three. We did hear though that she was selected as the 'best dressed'!

And by the time this is published Rebecca will have attended a reception in early October held by the King & Queen at St James's Palace in advance of the Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting.

So whilst all this socialising is no doubt very exciting for 'a girl who grew up on a Taranaki dairy farm', what it shows is that in the relatively short time she has held the CEO role at YES, she is certainly getting noticed and broadening her range of influential contacts in the corporate world which will clearly be useful in attracting support for the charity. As Rebecca says in the Newsroom interview, at the time she started the job "I didn't know London very well and didn't have any contacts, so I had to use a bit of the athlete mentality of sticking at it and trying to be resourceful." In that she has surely succeeded.

was featured in Bulletin 83 but one year on, she has just had perhaps one of her biggest challenges as Crown Prosecutor in Auckland in what has been described as possibly the most salacious murder trial in New Zealand's criminal history. A prominent Auckland eye surgeon was acquitted of the murder of his wife in a trial that stretched for nearly two months. As the lead Prosecutor, Alysha and her prosecution team, presented much evidence in the Auckland High Court that was circumstantial making a guilty verdict hard for Alysha and her fellow prosecutor to bring about a guilty verdict.

Ian Brookie (H 1990-94) has also been



involved in some high-profile cases with perhaps the most prominent being lan's defense of the killer of Grace

Millane, the British backpacker. Ian has even appeared for a defendant in a trial in which an Old Girl of the same year group, Alysha McClintock, was acting as Crown Prosecutor. Ian was once named as one of the up-and-coming litigation lawyers, and is a former Meredith Connell prosecutor, where he worked for a period with Rudd Watts and Stone (now MinterEllisonRuddWatts) until establishing criminal chambers Sentinel Chambers. At School Ian was a skilled debater and was also a quitarist in the School rock band 'Kate in the Lemon Tree' which won the Smokefree Rockauest in 1994.

has been the subject of an excellent piece of journalism in the Gisborne Herald during last September's World Alzheimer's Month. Philip was diagnosed with dementia in 2019 and the once simple tasks he used to do have now become the source of frustration.

The Lincoln educated farmer was also ordained an Anglican Priest in 1981 but is no longer able to address hundreds of people says Philip's wife, Pip. However, the Sherwood Club run by Alzheimers Gisborne/Tairawhiti is a place for dementia sufferers to socialise and do activities three days a week. After early reluctance, Philip is now ready and waiting for the Sunshine Bus to transport him to the venue which is helping him maximise a quality of life as his condition progresses. The Bulletin sends best wishes to Philip and Pip in helping lift the profile and create awareness of the disease.

He wants to ensure the region reaches its full potential and provide a prosperous future especially after the tough times they have endured from forestry slash after Cyclone Gabrielle. Maintaining the access road to Mangapoike Station has been a constant battle since the weather event for Dan and Tam, former WCBoT, School Board, WCS Foundation Trustee and daughter of Tim Burke (S 1952-56 **Head of House).** The couple were away from the farm when the storm hit and once it had passed, they had to helicopter in.

Fortunately all houses had back-up generators and radio telephones, but with 11km of the access road damaged, to get out to civilisation the Jex-Blakes had to journey through the back of the farm on a side-by-side and walk down the valley to rendezvous with their daughter Imogen (Gw 2010-14). One positive to emerge from the disaster has been the creation of the Te Arai Catchment Group, chaired by Tam, but it has also prompted Dan to question what defines sustainable land use. And the commercial justification for investment back into roading is similar to many communities up and down the east coast, where the councils and the government are facing sizeable repair costs.

Grant Adkins (S 1980-83) and his wife



Clare have a new venture growing pumpkins on their Okoia sheep and beef farm just out of Whanganui. This year was

their second harvest from the 10 hectares of pumpkins grown specifically for the seeds.

Summer Hill Seeds is their semiretirement project fitting into the gaps of the sheep and beef season. The paddock is managed spray free and the pumpkins are sun-ripened until harvest, when only the seeds leave the paddock, the skin and flesh being returned to the soil.

Processed on-farm, these seeds are greener, bigger and tastier than the pumpkin seeds usually sold in supermarkets, which were imported. Seconds are turned into oil and flour.

James Newell (M 1976-78) has been



recognised for his 46-year career (since leaving School in 1978) in surf lifesaving with two major honours at the

National Awards. He received a distinguished service medal and became the second Wanganui Surf Lifeguard Service to receive a lifetime membership to Surf Lifesaving New Zealand.

Over the years, he has filled most roles at the club, including IRB officer, chairman, facilitator, coach and club captain. Newell said swimming between the flags had remained a key message to the public since he started. "New Zealand has never had a drowning between the flags, ever."

James has no intention of retiring any time soon. "I've got five years until I get my 50-year badge, so I have to stay. That's the big one for me."

OBITUARY

John Coles QSM (H 1947-50) was born 15 April



1933, the second of six children whose English father had emigrated to New Zealand in 1925 and lived at Tauwhare. The Coles travelled to the United Kingdom for a holiday when John was two, establishing his lifelong connections to both his English family and the

country. After living in Auckland and with the coming of World War II the family returned to their Tauwhare farm. In 1941 John began boarding at St Peter's School, Cambridge. Rationing and air raid shelters were part of everyday life. He became known as "Postie Coles", given the job of cycling for and delivering the school mail.

From 1947 John travelled from Hamilton by train each term to attend WCS, about which he wrote in Bulletin 82. Of a social, outgoing disposition, John assumed the role of Master of Ceremonies at the formal school dances held in holiday periods, to which young ladies from Nga Tawa Diocesan were invited. His popularity was considerable.

With farming his chosen profession, upon returning from his second trip to England, John gained valuable experience on a station in Gisborne. In 1957 (aged 24), he purchased 470 acres of steepish land at Arohena. In 1966 John and Sally built a beach house at Whangamata, was a founding member of the Whangamata Golf Club, contributed to the Whangamata War Memorial Hall and boasted of hosting many WCS Old Boys meetings after golf. Eventually, he informally became known as the 'Mayor'!



At the age of 42 John made a significant, unconventional decision. Having toiled hard on the land all his life enjoying the benefits of the post-war rural boom, he felt it was time to give back to his community. He and wife his Sally sold their farm in Arohena, purchasing and developing a property overlooking Lake Karapiro.

Eventually 'Chiddingfold' (named after a village in England where John's father had links) would be enjoyed by visitors from all over the world including Prince Edward (whilst he was a WCS tutor in 1983), now the Duke of Edinburgh. Large parties were held for the WCS parents attending the Maadi Cup. John would store trailers laden with boats during competition and training. Under century old trees, flower bulbs planted in their hundreds grew into flowers, given away each year on Daffodil Day in support of the Cancer Society.

John's semi-retirement afforded him an opportunity to volunteer for a vast array of organisations in and around Cambridge. He became a stalwart of the local Citizens' Advice Bureau and Waikato Hospice. He served as Chairperson of the Friends of Resthaven, a facility devoted to elder care. He drove for the Red Cross, transporting patients to and from appointments at Waikato Hospital. He delivered food for Meals on Wheels, assisted with Remedial Reading at Cambridge High School and was a blood donor for over half a century. From 1994 John began volunteering at the Fieldays, working in the International Lounge, handing out kiwifruit and toasted sandwiches. John was also the President of the Waikato Branch of WCS Old Boys for many years, and a faithful attendee of the WCS Big School Society luncheons.

John's service to Cambridge embraced a wide range of sporting, cultural and ecological activities. In 1978 he helped organise the World Rowing Championships at Lake Karapiro. He had involvement in the Cambridge Community Board, the Cambridge branch of St John's Ambulance, the Cambridge Blind and Visually Impaired Society and the Maungatautari Ecological Island Trust. He was a founder of the Cambridge Bridge Club and an enthusiastic member of the Cambridge Golf Club. A health-related decision to forego long walks in favour of cycling when in his 60s saw John's participation in a number of charity and fundraising rides between 1993 and 1999.

John was a recipient of the Queen's Service Medal in 2010 for services to the Cambridge community. In 2013 he received a service award from the New Zealand National Fieldays Society, recognising decades of volunteer work. In 2015 a Metlifecare certificate named him New Zealander of the Year.

After a lifetime of service, John died in Cambridge on the 19 June 2024.

Obituary

Hamilton Logan (Hy 1938-42) was born on 21 November 1924 and died just three months short of his 100th birthday on 8 August 2024. He will be remembered by his family and the community around him for his friendship, perceptive nature, and reflections on the past to better the

As previously reported in The Bulletin, he made headlines around New Zealand in the last six months for attempting to walk 100kms before his 100th birthday in a campaign to fundraise for local charities offering young and old **A Second Chance at Life**. He hoped to create a perpetual funding stream for three of his chosen charities the Hawke's Bay Helicopter Rescue Service, St John Ambulance and the Rural Support Trust. The Hawke's Bay Foundation, the organisation Hamilton had partnered with for the walk, said he had walked 87 of the 100km although his son **Tim Logan (Hy 1969-73)** believed he was under-reporting the distance he was travelling. Tim said that when he walked with him once, a friend had a pedometer on and Hamilton was probably reporting less than two-thirds of the kilometres he was walking!

Hamilton kept a notebook and could remember names and faces extremely well, which he used to write his biography 'Fear Not Change', a copy of which he presented to Harvey House on the occasion of its own Centenary in 2021. An attitude of "always concentrating on the positives, not the negatives" had helped him through, along with what he calls a "pause button". "If I'm blindsided or feeling lost I pause, and I think, and I reason the answer instead of walking around in circles. I encourage people to pause when they feel overwhelmed and to discard anything that doesn't serve them well. It may even save your life or prompt a different direction."



Matt Holden (H 1981-85) and Mates of Mates for Mates Rural Support Trust organiser said Hamilton's knowledge and wisdom was extraordinary. "It's been a privilege to have known Hamilton Logan and share many farming adventures with him in recent years." Matt said a shared passion for sheep breeding and working with farmers was often the start of many conversations. The Bulletin reported in Issue 84 that Matt invited Hamilton to be a guest speaker at the inaugural "Mates of Mates for Mates" event at the Hawke's Bay Showgrounds in November 2023. We had hoped to be able to write in this issue that he had completed his pledge to walk 100kms before his 100th birthday but sadly for his family and friends, he came up a little short. At the end, Tim said he was still clear, lucid and strong.

The Bulletin remembers Hamilton's words delivered on many occasions on which he was called upon to speak..... "the most precious thing we have been blessed with is life, and life is for living."



Obituaries

John Plimmer (S 1941-45) was born 24



June 1927 and died two days before his 97th birthday. John often said how much he loved his years at WCS and he made many lifelong friends there.



In his first term in 1941, aged 13, his Housemaster gave him news that his father had been killed in Crete. His father, a Doctor, was Lieutenant Colonel and Commander of the NZ Field Ambulance in Crete. In those years (1941-45), John found that School life certainly helped him cope with the loss of his father. At

School, he won the Hurworth Memorial Prize; he was also a Prefect and in the Cricket XI 44-45.

John graduated in 1950 from Otago University with a Bachelor of Dental Surgery and with Commendation. In 1952, John married Alyth, nee Nelson, to whom he was married for 67 years; together they had two daughters, Elizabeth and Felicity, and one son, **John (S 1971-75)**.

John had a long and successful dental practice in Wellington. He served on and chaired many NZ Dental Association committees, including the Education and Research Foundation Boards. He was a Fellow of the International College of Dentists. He was a Lieutenant Colonel in the Royal NZ Dental Corps (Territorial Force). In 1986, John was appointed President of the NZ Dental Association and represented the Association overseas in Australia, UK and Europe.

He enjoyed gardening, music, NZ stamps and golf. John was Captain and later President of Royal Wellington Golf Club, Heretaunga.

John was named after his great-great Grandfather, an early settler (1841) who became known as "The Father of Wellington". There are seven generations of John Plimmer. A statue of John Plimmer with his dog is sited at Plimmer's Steps on Lambton Quay; and the seaside town Plimmerton was so named to recognise Plimmer's leading role in a privately funded railway line out of Wellington to the Manawatu.

Robert (Bob) Wake (M 1956-60) died on 23 May 2024 aged 82,



just months after he retired from his role as Manager of the Cricket 1st XI. After umpiring with Harry Fullerton-Smith (G 1955-59) for 121 traditional two day matches for the 1st XI

(with just 18 LBWs!) from 1974 to 2001, Bob began scoring for the 1st XI turning his handwritten scorebook into a work of art. He created his own legacy with his coloured pens and turned cricket scoring into a masterpiece, always presenting a laminated and framed copy to any boy who attained either a century or five wickets in an innings. He was appointed the 1st XI Manager in 1994 and during his tenure they won two Gillette Cups, went on three tours to the Geelong Cricket Festival and one to the Hutchins Cricket Festival. As anyone who accompanied him to 1st XI fixtures would know, he was a great 'tourist' and that also extended to his support of the 1st XV.

Bob was rewarded with an Honours Tie in 2021 for his many years of umpiring, scoring and managing the Cricket 1st XI over those 47 years and ultimately wore the 'title' of Whanganui Collegiate School's 'Mr Cricket' with distinction

Bob was an extremely talented cricketer and rugby player both at School and post school years and his knowledge of both games was unquestionable having played representative cricket for Whanganui, served on the Whanganui Cricket Association and made an Honorary Life Member of the Willows Cricket Club. Liz and her three Old Girl daughters and their families have lost a wonderfully warm and talented man, an iconic and legendary character and a friend to so many WCS sportsmen and women and his loss will be keenly felt by all. Our deepest sympathies go out to his family. Rest in Peace Mr Cricket!

James Howard (Jim), QSM (H 1953-56) - died 6 June 2024. Jim Howard's wide-ranging service to the community encompassed conservation, horticulture, agriculture, education, local government and national politics.

A member of the Royal Forest & Bird Protection Society of NZ for over 50 years, Jim helped found and served as Chair of the Rangitikei branch.

He also chaired the Bushy Park Tarapuruhi Homestead & Forest Reserve Trust Board, helping to establish an arboretum, and was part of the team that brought North Island robin from the Waimarino forest for release into the Bushy Park forest. Life membership of the NZ Rhododendron Society reflected his particular horticultural interest, local Federated Farmers (Chair from 1969-74) his agricultural, while the Whanganui Rangitikei Catchment Board, the Rangitikei District Council, NZ National Party (locally & nationally), the local Anglican Church and the Nga Tawa School Board of Trustees were beneficiaries of his interest and service.

With his wife Diana he had three daughters and one son, **Andrew (H 1988-92)**.
