

I would like to acknowledge and thank Mr Alan Richardson who will retire from the position of International Director during
Term 1 next year and Mr Andrew Brunt who will be leaving Grey
House as Housemaster at the end of the year. Two wonderful servants of the School. Mr Richardson has been a cornerstone of WCS, initially joining us in 2002 and serving until 2015, before returning in 2017 to continue his exemplary work until the present. Over the years, Mr Richardson has displayed unwavering dedication and commitment to our international students, playing a pivotal role in their integration and success within our School environment. His contributions have been invaluable and his absence will certainly be felt by all.

During his tenure, Mr Richardson's efforts have not only enriched the lives of countless students and families, yet have also significantly enhanced the international profile and reputation of Whanganui Collegiate School. His outstanding service and leadership have left an indelible mark on our community and for this, we are profoundly grateful.

At Whanganui Collegiate School we have exceptional staff. I would like to take this opportunity to thank our staff, teaching and non-teaching for the committed work they do to provide the best learning environment for our students. We continue to strive in our performance academically and again we are well placed going into our 2024 examinations – we strive for excellence, we plan, prepare and we perform.

This year, Cambridge IGCSE at Whanganui Collegiate School has held particular significance. Cambridge reflects not only the academic rigor and global standards of our students but also their resilience and adaptability in a rapidly changing world. Cambridge is a cornerstone of our academic framework, fostering critical thinking, in-depth knowledge and a global perspective—all qualities that are essential for developing outstanding global citizens. This year's Year 11 has faced the challenges of preparing under the pressures of an evolving educational landscape, yet they have approached the exams with determination and integrity. Their success is a testament to the strong academic foundation provided at WCS, and their achievement in these examinations will set the stage for future endeavours, both academically and in the wider world.

Round Square continues to thrive, with our exchanges with Kinross Wolaroi School in NSW, and junior students attending a conference in Canada. We also have Thornton Humphrey, Thomas Fraser and Lucy Hobbs who will be part of an international Round Square team of 60 students on two priority construction projects that will have a long-lasting, positive impact on the environment and the local community in Hoa Binh Province in Vietnam.

Their projects are helping construct a dam that will address the supply of water to farming land that is limited during the dry seasons, yet floods during monsoon. The new dam will improve crop productivity and therefore the income of local villagers. Also installing solar energy lighting poles as a safe and sustainable solution to a 2.5km stretch of road used to connect villages, that currently has no lighting. What an opportunity to make a difference.

Of note, we also had our first Cricket exchange with Scarborough College UK, with Hamish Cranstone and Charlie Mabin attending the school in Yorkshire for a term. Next year we have other exchanges in the pipeline with Round Square schools and I am thrilled to announce that Gordonstoun, Scotland will be one of those schools. In December 2025 we will host our 2nd world conference 'Journeys without limits: Uniting the world through adventure. Exceptional opportunities for our students.

With our commitment to boarding excellence, Whanganui Collegiate School undertook the opportunity to be benchmarked by the International Boarding Accreditation Scheme. Drawing upon the highly respected and well-established benchmarks of standards for boarding schools in the United Kingdom the BSA reflects the huge diversity of schools globally. In May this year, we became the first school in New Zealand to be accredited under the International Boarding Accreditation Scheme.

Whanganui Collegiate School is now internationally accredited in three key areas: Character Education, Academics, and Boarding. We are the only school in Aotearoa featuring all three, making Whanganui Collegiate School a leader in the New Zealand and global educational landscape.

Student life at Whanganui Collegiate School is unique. From the Houses to the classrooms to the sporting fields, to drama, music and debating it is our aim as educators to know you. To speak to aspirations rather than insecurities, encourage them to flourish – to step alongside and say... we will take you out of your comfort zone – because - there is more in you than you know. As we approach the end of 2024, I am very thankful for the year, it's challenges and opportunities. At Whanganui Collegiate School, we offer a unique richness of community. This is the essence of a seven day, boarding and day school where learning is a way of life, and at WCS, this happens 24/7.

Our Cultural, Performing Arts and Sport programmes are tremendous. The commitment from our staff, parents and community for a rich, rigorous and accessible co-curricular programme is second to none. We strive for excellence and our achievements in this area are vast. Our two awards assemblies this year have been brilliant occasions, celebrating the achievement of our wonderful students. Today again, highlights

the incredible success and my thanks to our staff, along with our coaches, managers and itinerant teachers for their tireless and committed work to our co-curricular programme.

Our School continues to thrive – the foundations are set and there is a robust plan for continuous improvement and sustained success. Yes, our roll continues to improve but it's not just about numbers - it is about people. We are developing children of promise to young adults of character.

To our current Heads of School and our 2024 Blueshirt team along with all student leaders, House Prefects and sporting and cultural captains – thank you for your leadership of the School. You are a fine group and I look forward to seeing where you go from here – I know that you will earn the respect of anyone you work with. Sam and Harriet, you both have been an absolute pleasure to work alongside, it has been an honour.

And so, to our Leavers and your families, thank you for providing an opportunity for our School to partner with you in educating your children. It is a unique situation involving trust, communication and at times challenge. You have become part of the Collegiate family and this is a unique bond which will last, through yourselves and through your children. You too, gain that pillar of lifelong friendships. Thank you for walking this road with us and trusting us in guiding your young adults.

Head of School Address -Harriet Douglas



I would like to welcome you to the Whanganui Collegiate School Senior Prizegiving for 2024. I also want to extend a special thank you to Mrs Cranstone for presenting our Academic Prizes.

It feels like yesterday that I was sitting on the stage in Big School for the first time, wide-eyed

and frozen like a deer in headlights. And yet, here we are today—at the Senior Prize Giving, delivering my final address as Head of School for 2024.

What a year it has been! Selwyn won Athletics for the first time since the Berlin Wall came down 37 years ago. We enjoyed swimming sports, House Music, Cross Country, Tikanga, Tug of War, Winter Sports Festival and everything else in between.

My journey to Whanganui Collegiate School began on a whim. During the summer holidays of Year 10, when I met a group of WCS girls at the Lake. I was struck by how kind they were to one another—genuine friends who only had positive things to say about their school. I wasn't unhappy at my old school and I was well supported, but deep down, I knew there was more to school than just badges, grades and prizes.

I'm a little embarrassed to admit it, but I was obsessed with all three. What intrigued me was that these girls didn't seem to prioritise them the same way I did. And so, without telling my parents, I not only emailed the School but filled out all the forms, applied and organised an interview. My mum received a call asking if she was aware of the application and the upcoming interview— I had kind of mentioned it but forgot to tell her about the interview, which was in two days. After much convincing, just four days before school started, I found myself in Mr Brown's office with my mum, who was kindly entertaining yet another one of my crazy ideas. I told her I'd know whether I wanted to come to WCS the moment I walked out of that meeting.

It was a long interview, but I distinctly remember looking out at the No 1 field, imagining how incredible it would be to play football there. And I also remember Mr Brown saying that he believes in second chances because no one is perfect and it's what you do with your second chance that counts. I was sold. Before I knew it, I was standing outside Bishops House in my No 1s which were far too big, looking at the place I would call home for the next three years. Thank you to my parents for the faith you had in my crazy idea and in fact to all parents for the opportunity you have given us.

Year 11 was an eye-opener. WCS was a whole new world and like anything, it had its ups and downs. I learned so many new things, like the unspoken rule that only Year 12s and 13s sit on the couches and claim Saturday supper first, while everyone else sits

on the floor and hopes there is the good supper left over which luckily being a Year 11 meant there almost always was. I also learned, much to my surprise, that 'Saturday School' actually meant going to class on Saturday mornings and not just lounging around in bed at school. And that mufti is not to be worn on Friday nights and Birks are strictly not allowed on the drive.

But the most important lesson I learned in Year 11 was how to fail. I submitted an internal with complete confidence that I had nailed it. But when I got my result, it was my first-ever 'Not Achieved'. I thought my world had ended because, before coming to WCS, a 'Not Achieved' would have been disastrous. I begged my teacher for a reassessment, but she told me I'd learn more from failing than if I were given a reassessment. For weeks, I was devastated. But with time, I gained perspective and realised the lesson my teacher wanted me to learn. Failure isn't the end of the world; it's the backbone of learning. Mistakes are just detours, and not getting it right is what pushes us to get better. These lessons that sting in the moment are the ones that stay with us for life.

Year 12 came around and we were now technically classified as seniors, finally sitting on the couches, feeling perhaps a little more senior than we truly were. But Year 12 taught us something far more important than status—it taught us the value of community. Throughout our time here at WCS, we have experienced a unique sense of belonging that is unlike anything we have ever known. This school has embraced each of us individually, while at the same time weaving us together into something bigger than ourselves. Over our time here each of us has formed our own community within the greater school experience, whether that be through our Houses, sports teams, music or drama groups, or our circle of friends.

I remember Collegiate Weekend in 2023—my first proper, non-COVID athletics event—and suddenly, it all made sense why people call Athletics Night one of the best nights of the year. The walk to Cooks Gardens with our Houses, the chants from the bleachers as we cheered on our runners, the thrill of competing under the lights and then celebrating together as a House, no matter the outcome. It was in those moments that I truly understood what it meant to be part of the Collegiate Community. What stands out most isn't the competition or the cheers—it's the pride, the history and the traditions that connect us. The deep and genuine care we have for each other and an unwavering sense of pride in the Black and Blue. It's that pride that has turned this place into our second home. And home, as I've learned, isn't just about shared last names or even blood—it's about commitment and care.

A special moment was dedicated to recognising the achievements of Year 13 students. Over 45 students contributed to animations designed to fit seamlessly within the School's window frames.


A notable projection focused on the School's sporting history, exploring the dynamic balance between tradition and change.

During the school year one of our own students lost his battle with cancer and we needed to say goodbye to him. Micky Peacock was in his final year at WCS, an excellent

sportsperson, and a fierce supporter of Harvey House. The School and his close friends were able to support his family and Micky in his final months. The lifelong relationships built during his five years at School will mean his spirit and memory will carry on.

At the time of Micky's final weeks, the Chapel became a "third space", not home or study, but a safe comforting place for students to pray for or think about Micky and light a candle as an action of care, compassion and release. After Micky died and until his funeral on his farm and School memorial service, the Chapel had a constant flow of students who found the Chapel an inviting space to say goodbye and reflect on a myriad of thoughts which bubble to the surface in times of grief. I was immensely proud of how the students handled themselves and cared for each other during this time.

The regular rhythm of weekly Chapel on Wednesdays gave me an opportunity to lead the staff and student community in worship. We are grateful for the loyal support of Mr Don Colway on the organ and the very talented Mr Ellsworth and Mr Tetley with the Chapel Choir. Their faithful support of the Chapel music adds greatly to our time together. As seasons come and go, we welcome a new initiative with the choir which will see a renewed group of students bringing us song.

I have had a great group of students who have helped me find my feet in the Chapel; thanks to Sam Livingstone, Pippa Kaiser, Akira Mongkornhong, Dylan Anderson, Casey Broadhead and Gareth Sheard. They have supported our World Vision and Daffodil Day projects and given me helpful student feedback.

The Chapel was the gathering place for this year's Battle of Britain service which saw a large number of people gather with the Air Cadets to remember the fallen soldiers. They came with old ambulances and vehicles from the war days; it was a memorable event, as was the ANZAC service where Mr Rob van Dort gave a moving address which linked fallen soldiers stories with current students. Both of these occasions helped us to remember that our Chapel is a Memorial Chapel and their lives have shaped our country.

The annual OBGA Chapel services took place and were well attended. The Chapel continues to be a special place for Old Boys and Girls to get married or to visit when they come back to Whanganui. We also continue to give to a range of local, national, and international aid to relief organisations through our collections on Collegiate Weekends. The outward facing ministry of compassion is strong in the students who are keen to serve the community wherever possible. Some have volunteered as collectors for local organisations, the Year 12s worked tirelessly at the Rotary Foodbank drive and we have a very strong team who help with the Breakfast in Schools programme at Tawhero School.

I am looking forward to beginning the new year and experience the full cycle of the life of the Chapel in the coming year. Please feel free to visit the Chapel if you are passing by.

ANZAC 2024

The Annual ANZAC commemoration was held on Friday 12 April the final day of Term 1. Despite heavy rain on the Thursday and wet weather forecast for the Friday, the crosses were put out and again made for a thoughtful reminder of the sacrifices of our Old Boys and Staff.

Intermittent showers persisted throughout Friday and so the decision was made to hold the Service in the Chapel. The weather did not deter the RNZAF who flew in with an A109 Light Utility Helicopter, landing on the No. 1 Field in the morning and taking off shortly before the Service to provide a flyover.

Thirty-two crosses were placed at the altar during the Service; and we were again privileged to have family members attend to place the crosses in memory of their fallen relatives. These included regular attendees Bea and Martin Rockel, George Marshall, Jamie Anderson, Stephen Birch and Trish Keiller. Susie Watts, daughter of Arthur Wheeler, travelled from Auckland with members of her family to place the cross of her father who was killed in World War II.

Current students Rebecca and Millie Boden-Cave, Tom and George Gilbertson, Milly and Fred Whisker, Ben Poulton, Eddie Marshall, Oscar Absolom, Nixon Wright, Oliver Openshaw and Hugo Giblin placed Crosses for their Old Boy relatives who fell in various wars. Connor Rees and Mitch Karatau placed the crosses of Old Boys who had died on 12 April; the cross of former member of staff Hugh Butterworth was placed by Housemaster of Selwyn House, Mr Selwyn Hodges and the privilege of placing the cross for the Unknown Soldier was given to Cleveland Pue.

Two crosses placed for the first time were those of Malcolm Beattie and William Williams. Beattie, who was the cover feature on this years' service booklet, had his cross placed by Old Boy Toby Craig, recipient of the Malcolm Beattie Memorial Medal in 2023. William Williams' cross is a new addition to the Service. Williams was killed in North Wales in 1981 while training with the Royal Green Jackets and his cross was placed by the 2023 Recipient of the William Williams Memorial Trophy, Amy McHardy.

The address was given by Old Boy SQNLDR James Peters. James was Deputy Head of Harvey House and a Blue Shirt in 2005. He is a senior flying instructor at Ohakea and his message was very well received by students and adults in attendance.

Our Service was again well supported by serving members of the New Zealand Defence Force. WNGCDR Becky Willis and GPCPT Peter Gibson, Base Commander of RNZAF Base Ohakea, placed the crosses for the three Herrick brothers, all of whom were pilots killed in World War II. LtCol Tim Woodman, placed the crosses of the three Knight brothers killed in World War I. Mr Don Merito of 28 Māori Battalion read the Ode To The Fallen in Te Reo with the English version read by WNGCDR Willis. It was lovely to have former member of staff Peter Preston lay a wreath on behalf of the students of Empson, Marris, Porritt and Gilligan Houses. A wreath was also laid by Ewen Noble of the RSA.

Mark Keelty has for many years played the Last Post and Reveille and we are fortunate to have someone of his skill again contribute to the occasion. The trumpet, when played so well in the Chapel, is just beautiful.

One of the highlights of this year has been our exchange program, with our first Round Square Exchange with Kinross Wolaroi School in Australia. Four of our students spent time experiencing life at their school, while we welcomed four Kinross students to Whanganui Collegiate.





The exchange proved to be a resounding success, with students building meaningful relationships, learning about different educational systems, and fully immersing themselves in the cultural life of their host schools. These exchanges enrich not only the students involved but also the wider school community, strengthening our ties within the Round Square network.

Another milestone this year was the selection of our first student to the prestigious Round Square Service Initiative in Vietnam this December. This service-based programme, which focuses on hands-on community support and environmental projects, will see three of our students participating in this initiative. They will join peers from around the world to work on sustainable projects, gaining invaluable insights into teamwork, cultural exchange, and the power of collective action.

In Term 2 a group of seven students and two staff attended a Junior Conference in Canada. This was a huge success, offering students the chance to connect with their peers from around the world. With a focus on environmental change and personal growth, the conference encouraged students to step outside their comfort zones, engage in meaningful discussions, and look at different ways of combatting climate change. They also had the opportunity to be hosted by Glenlyon Norfolk School who had attended our own Round Square Conference last year. It was great to spend time reconnecting and experiencing their campus and natural wildlife.





Looking ahead, we are thrilled about our upcoming exchange with Gordonstoun School in Scotland. Known for their strong emphasis on outdoor education and leadership, this exchange will undoubtedly be a valuable experience for our students. We will also be attending the Round Square International Conference in Dubai at the end of Term 3, 2025, where students will explore new ideas, cultural connections and focus activities based on the IDEALS.

December 2025 will be another exciting moment for Whanganui Collegiate as we prepare to host another Global Round Square Conference, this time focusing on adventure and internationalism.

This will be a unique opportunity to bring together students from all over the world to explore these important themes, share experiences, and build lasting friendships, all while being hosted on our campus.



As we reflect on another year and look ahead to even greater opportunities, it is clear that our commitment to the IDEALS of Round Square continues to be at the centre of what we do as a school. From service initiatives to international exchanges, global forums to adventurous challenges, Whanganui Collegiate School continues to embrace the philosophy of Round Square in everything we do.

PASTORAL CARE & WELLBEING

According to Google, the main wellbeing challenges for our adolescents in 2024 were mental health, peer pressure, social media, body image, peer and online bullying. For adults, challenges in 2024 may have been linked to cost-of-living stress and subsequent sleep challenges.

This year at Whanganui Collegiate School students faced challenges in 2024 as they:

- Transitioned from one school setting, or one year group, to another
- · Started boarding for the first time
- Met new people and made new friends
- Started new subjects, cultural activities and sports
- · Faced the challenges of IGCSE and NCEA
- · Experienced ever growing social media pressures
- Became more aware of online scamming and extortion
- Dealt with the emerging and evolving force of AI
- Experienced the loss of fellow Year 13 student, Micky Peacock

But for some of our students the biggest challenge in 2024 was the law change requiring all students to either leave their mobile phone at home or hand it in for safekeeping in the House during the School day. For some students being disconnected both physically and emotionally from their phones required some getting used to. Some found it hard. Others surprising themselves

with the ease at which they managed this separation. Now more than ever, some people are making choices to consciously guit social media periodically as they feel it helps prioritise their time for other pursuits such as being present for friends and family, mindfulness, recreation sport, cultural and academic activity. Research suggests that less time on devices creates a positive impact on people's wellbeing, their anxiety levels, their sense of self, their relationships and their coping mechanisms. Whilst being connected by devices is a great thing, there is significant evidence showing the negative impact of social media on mental health in our young people, and yes, us adults too. It is, therefore, no coincidence that the Oxford word of the year in 2024 is 'brain rot', a term used to capture concerns about the impact of consuming excessive amounts of low-quality online content, especially on social media. I fully support and respect those who have made a conscious decision to 'put down' their phones this year. Certainly a goal to consider for 2025.

Lighting Upgrade in the Prince Edward Auditorium


The Prince Edward Auditorium was opened in 1984 and was designed by Sir Miles Warren. The original Par Can lighting has been replaced with the assistance of a grant from the Four Regions Trust.

The new LX lights were installed in time for House Music in June. The new lights head fixtures can be controlled and operated from the operations booth.

The LED lights consume much less power, leading to lower operational costs and are full colour. When programmed into a show, the fixtures can be pointed in different places depending on the requirements of the scene.

The new DMX controller is significantly easier for students and staff to learn and operate, therefore allowing the production team to spend more time creating the scenes.



In the absence of the group leaders, **Dylan Anderson**, **Matilda Dreyer**, **Nixon Wright** and **Toshiya Kuroki** accompanied me to the headwaters of the Whanganui River on the slopes of Mt Tongariro and we filled the ceremonial flask that would accompany the group on the journey to the mouth of the river in Castlecliff.

The rest of the group arrived throughout the afternoon and rowers and cricketers arrived from their regatta and fixtures around 6.30pm.

After an enjoyable dinner, map readers and radio operators were chosen for the night navigation due to begin in the early hours of the morning. It was then 'early to bed' to snatch a few hours of sleep before a big day.

We woke at midnight for our 'early breakfast' of porridge and bananas and at 1.00am Mr Tom Dryden, Miss Sophie Fifield and I headed out into the bush ahead of the group for the night navigation. They departed 10 minutes later.



It was a beautiful star-filled night. In the many years of doing Source to Sea I do not remember such good conditions. This, together with the very methodical following of the map and instructions, saw the group make good progress. On two or three occasions they ventured the wrong way but soon realised their error and were able to back-track to where they knew they were last in the correct place. Mr Dryden, Miss Fifield and I were often nearby without them knowing and it was wonderful to see the teamwork that was evident.

By 5.45am they arrived at the location where Messrs Barry Touzel and Gareth Wright had parked the truck and bicycles. We had a second breakfast before heading off on the bicycles at 7.00am.



The first three kilometres of the bike ride is tough and took just over an hour to complete. There were parts that were so steep and slippery that we had to form a human-chain to pull the bicycles up. There were some very muddy bodies and bikes. Fortunately, we also had to cross streams that gave us the opportunity to rinse ourselves. While it was a challenging three kilometres, there was much laughter.



Fatigue and hunger began to set in towards the bottom of Fishers Track and despite snacking on muesli bars and lollies along the



way, by 11.00am there was much enthusiasm for lunch. They found the last 10km along Upper Reteruke Road a real challenge and there were some tired bodies by the time we reached the War Memorial and Horse Sculpture at the Oio Road intersection.



After lunch, we had a further 27km to cycle to Whakahoro. While 27km is not a significant distance, the nature of this section of the route was challenging. About 24km is an undulating stoney gravel road that is heavily corrugated, not allowing the legs any respite. Passing vehicles also created a lot of dust. By now the group was very quiet.

We arrived at Whakahoro at about 2.45pm. Bikes were loaded on the trailer; tents were pitched and we headed for the river for a much-needed swim. The cold water was just what the muscles needed. By about 4.00pm most students had fallen asleep.



After dinner, they sorted their gear for the river-leg of the journey into their barrels and again headed for sleep. When I went to bed shortly after 8.00pm, there was a lovely silence hanging over the campsite.

It rained gently throughout the night and we rose in the morning at around 6.00am. Tents were taken down, barrels packed, breakfast eaten and when the canoes slid into the river at 9.00am it was still raining.

Ms Gigi Bronwal reports on the river leg of the journey ... The weather varied from light drizzle to heavy downpours throughout the first day and after about an eight hour journey the team arrived at John Coull Hut, cold wet and hungry. Tents were set up and a meal of Nachos was shared, by nightfall the rain had eased, and all were pleased to wake to a dry sky, a Robin's call and Mr Wilson singing Lord of the Dance.

The river had risen overnight and there was a lot of teamwork involved to get back on the water due to a canoe jam of about 40 people, all eager to get their day started. A competitive game of grid iron and a few swims to cool off, the team also walked to the Bridge to Nowhere for lunch. We made great time thanks to the extra river flow and reached Tieke Kainga in the early afternoon. We enjoyed a welcome at Tieke from those who had visited before and sang waiata with other travellers from around the world. After setting up our camp everyone enjoyed a swim and then a large game of touch rugby. We fell asleep to the sound of morepork and kiwi in the surrounding bush.

The final day on the river saw everyone paddle under a waterfall and involved navigating a few rapids, the rapids were high thanks to earlier rain and only one boat capsized on the last bend before Pipiriki.







Source to Sea report continued



On Wednesday, I met the group as they completed the river-leg of the journey at Pipiriki. We sorted gear, saddled the bikes and headed out for the approximately 50km cycle to Old Boy John Thurlow's farm near Atene. Our first hill race, Welcome Back Hill came early in the ride and Lochie Pennington pipped Dylan Anderson by three seconds, with Sarah Couper winning the girls' race. It was then an enjoyable ride in good conditions to the overnight camp.

I woke the group at 5.00am on Thursday morning to prepare for the orienteering activity. The five pairs did well to locate the clues that allowed them to unlock the combination lock on the bicyles, and we headed out for the final leg of the trip that included the second King of the Mountain race up the Gentle Annie Hill. On this occasion **Dylan Anderson** was too strong for **Lochie Pennington** and secured the title with a nine-second win over Lochie. **Sarah Couper** was again convincing in the girls' race.

There was much excitement as we mounted the bicycles for the final stretch into Whanganui and after crossing the river at the Upukongaro bridge, we tracked along the river to be met by a group of parents and staff at the north mole of the Whanganui River. After greetings from parents, **Ben Brunton** and **Holly Smyth** emptied the flask filled from the headwaters of the River into the sea to mark the end of Source to Sea.

My thanks to the staff who sacrificed the first week of their holiday for Source to Sea; Messrs Barry Touzel, Gareth Wright, Tom Dryden, Mark Wilson, Mathew Owen and Grant Butler; Mses Gigi Bronwal, Sophie Fifield, Molly Hale and Bethany Harper. Without them, Source to Sea could not have happened.

CRICKET

We reflect on a successful 2023/24 season, where our 1st XI made the Whanganui Premier 1 Grand Final, competed well in their traditional fixtures and made history in their unbeaten tour of Australia. In Term 4 the 1st XI won eight games in a row to find themselves in the Whanganui Premier Grand Final against Wanganui United, falling just short against the defending men's champions.

The Australian tour was next up, where the XI took on some of Australia's top schools, most notably making history with the highest score for a Whanganui Collegiate School team in a 50 over game, with 338/7. Captain **Connor Rees**'s 181 was also the highest individual score in a traditional match for Whanganui Collegiate School. Finishing up the tour unbeaten, the 1st XI headed into the two-day fixtures full of confidence.

A dominant display against Rathkeale College ended in a frustrating draw before another white ball encounter with St Peter's Cambridge. The first game going to St Peter's, WCS bounced back to dominate the second game and take the victory. Hutt International Boys' School took a late final wicket on day two to win that traditional match before the 1st XI faced a strong New Plymouth Boys' High School side in the Gillette regional qualifier. The WCS score wasn't enough as NPBHS finished the game off four down, to win by six wickets. A disappointing exit from the National Competition, but great learnings to take from it. Draws against Wellington College, New Plymouth Boys' High School and Christ's College then rounded off the red ball season, before a final trip up to St Paul's Collegiate. Losing a tight T20 on Day 1, WCS turned around to win the second game by seven wickets, rounding off a superb season.

The Hunt Trophy was the final hit out for the boys, thumping their way to the final with big wins over Paraparaumu College, St Patrick's Silverstream and Rongotai. Wellington College proved too strong in the final, chasing down 190 in 20 overs, with a superb 100 scored. Ultimately the big games didn't fall our way with losses in the Premier Grand Final, Gillette Regional qualifier and Hunt Trophy Final this season, but this does not define the 1st XI season, seeing them achieve great successes throughout and playing an entertaining brand of cricket.

The 2nd XI competed in the inaugural Premier 2 T20 competition, before moving into the 40-over competition in Term 1. They competed well throughout the year, falling short of making the finals, but having some success in some brilliant tight affairs. With two ties and a narrow loss to Rathkeale after taking five of the last six wickets without the score changing, the 2nd XI had a season to remember.

The newly launched Seddon Cup started for our Colts and while we were on the end of some tough results, the growth made within that squad showed as they qualified for the NZCT National Finals as the Central Districts representative. Taking on the countries best Colts sides, Whanganui Collegiate School Colts Black bowled Auckland Grammar, Christchurch Boys' High School and Waitaki Boys' High School out for under 100. A superb tournament for the boys saw more great learnings as this exciting young group moves forward.

The Girls 1st XI enjoyed some great local success and will look to dominate again locally this year, knocking over Whanganui Girls' College and Whanganui High School comfortably while chasing down our traditional rivals in the girls' arena. Entering into the Aimee Watkins Trophy, the Girls 1st XI competed well, beating Solway College and tieing the match against Kuranui College. Another excellent outing for the girls and a competition we will look to challenge in again next season.

Finally, the Junior Colts Blue competed in the T16 League in which they had a narrow loss in the semi-final. After a loss in the final the year before, we will look to go one better next season to claim the T16 title which has so far eluded us.

We commenced the season with over ninety rowers. Various initiatives employed over the previous seasons were continued and have had a positive effect especially with boys' participation. These included steak meals in Term 1, Have-A-Go day during a sleepover weekend and during Year 9 PE classes. Also, positive promotion on social media platforms. A further 31 joined the Academy in Term 1.

Some Wednesday afternoons mid-February were absolutely spectacular with 110+ rowers out on the Whanganui River.

Our first event for the season held in November was the Whanganui Rowing Association B2B 10km race, from Upokongaro Cycle Bridge to the Town Bridge. Our Girls 8+ and two Boys quads were all near the front of the field.

The Johns Trophy at Waitara was unfortunately cancelled due to shocking weather predictions.

The whole Club competed at the Jury Cup regatta, held on our home course the first weekend of December. It was our first major regatta of the season and all our rowers were entered in 2-3 events each. WCS finished 2nd= of the nine competing clubs, with some outstanding efforts.

On 15 December the whole squad competed at the three-day Christmas Regatta held at Lake Karapiro. Again, most of our rowers were entered in 2-3 events each and amassed a total of nineteen "A" finals and another four "B" finals. A highlight was both our Boys and Girls Intermediate Octos placing first in their A Finals.

After a five-week Christmas break we reconvened late January with Camp at WCS. The rowers showed plenty of enthusiasm and got into some good training with some excellent gains being made in technique, strength and fitness. At the end of Camp, our rowers attended the North Island Club Champs at Lake Karapiro. Camp gains showed with plenty of A Finals and four trips to the medal dias.

Several weeks of training followed before all attended the North. Island Secondary School Champs gaining very pleasing results: seventeen "A" finals and another nine "B" finals. Unfortunately the dreaded Covid appeared amongst the Junior squad and they had to be isolated with the scratching of six Finals. The Senior squad turned up the pressure though with eight trips to the medal dias.

With our junior squads having completed their season at NISS a smaller selected squad attended NZSS Championships (Maadi) Regatta – Lake Ruataniwha, Twizel. We were sent off with a magnificent School haka. Racing commenced on the Monday morning with heats and continued throughout the week with repechages, quarters and semi-finals until Friday at which point we had achieved a very credible total of nine "A" finals and five "B" finals. The rowers converted this into six sets of medals and out of 104 Schools competing we were 4th= in the Star Trophy for overall champion rowing secondary school, also 4th outright in Presidents Scull for champion sculling rowing secondary school. This was the best result for a considerable time.

Inter-House Rowing was held late April. Although it rained a lot, the Whanganui River behaved and was very good until chopping up a bit just before the Eights final. In a rather dominant display, Hadfield House won the overall points Herbert Pryce Cup, also winning the VIII Trophy.

A wonderful Dinner Awards evening was held later that day. Awards are listed in Prize Giving section of this publication.

Our recreational sailors can all be pleased with the progress they have made this season. They have built up confidence and were able to handle the boats in a variety of wind conditions. These students practised tacking, jibing, reaching and running.

As they became more confident many liked nothing more than hiking out and going as fast as possible.

Those that made excellent progress in their sailing were Oliver Bernard, Juliet Smith, Mac Davidson, Hanon Takahashi, Alexis Gheervarghese and Jacob Hagan (who was awarded the Junior Sailor of the Year). These students started in Toppers and then progressed to both Bics and Splash dinghies.

Hazel Davey and Zaria Athena developed into competent sailors and were always very helpful in supporting the junior students.

Our competitive squad consisted two crews for the Feva boats. Haichen Lai and Caden Drover in one boat, Will Managh and Jackson Doughty in the other. This year we attended two regattas, the first was at Plimmerton. Here we spent a long day out of the water and raced three races. This regatta was a valuable experience and both crews were really able to improve their starts.

The main regatta of the year was the Feva nationals held at the Maraetai Sailing Club in the Hauraki Gulf, Auckland. This regatta consisted of 46 boats competing in eight races over two days. There was a large breaking swell and the wind was so strong that immediately the fleet left the land twelve capsized all at once. The race was cancelled and crews struggled to surf the large waves back to shore. The next day there remained a good swell on the sea and extra races had to be held to make up for those cancelled. Will and Jackson continued to improve throughout the day as they became more experienced with the conditions. Their best result was 39th.





This young woman has all the makings to achieve well in any code she chooses. Her efforts are characterised by passion, resilience, work ethic and this, combined with her natural ability, make her a wonderful potential to achieving both nationally and internationally.

Harriet Douglas - Academic Cup.

The Academic Cup is usually a closely contested affair, however, there was no question this year. This young lady prides herself on striving for greatness and doing well in everything she sets her mind to. What sets her apart from others however is the unassuming nature, calm and poise at which she goes about. Academically, the winner is a highly motivated, hard working and engaged learner who is an intelligent and mature student who strives to do her very best. This is exemplified in her gaining Excellence Endorsement in NCEA Level 1 and 2 and she is on track to achieve excellence again this year with her remaining Level 3 subjects.
