COLLEGE BOARD AND SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

Both Boards acknowledge the Headmaster and all staff, students and parents for the resilience shown in dealing with what was a disrupted first half year impacted by COVID and the flu. School events have returned and we thank everyone who has helped to ensure that School life has remained as normal as possible.

We are pleased to confirm that over the summer a new boiler room and plant room will be installed in Grey House, thanks to the generosity of Grey House Old Boys and the Foundation. Fortunately, the Foundation funded all the plumbing hardware a year ago, at a cost of \$200,000, which would be substantially more if we had to purchase it today. Copper piping has gone up five times!

We thank our Grey House students and parents for their patience over the stalled renovation to bring Grey House in line with the other boys' Houses. With international students unable to get into New Zealand for two years and massively increased costs due to inflation, the Board has had to take a conservative approach to our discretionary spend, and thus the Grey House upgrade had to be delayed.

The Grey refurbishment will be done incrementally. The next stages are the junior bathroom, then the senior bathroom, which we would like to complete over the course of 2023.

Thank you very much to all those Grey Old Boys who have contributed \$130k to this project. We would encourage all our Grey Old Boys to make a contribution on some level to expedite the completion of the full refurbishment. For donations to the Grey House project please contact the School for a donation form.

The quality of staff applying for positions in all roles is high and continues our drive

towards excellence, especially in teaching and boarding, and in the areas of administration.

The School continues to develop a high-performing learning environment, fostering a positive, innovative and collaborative workplace which attracts, develops and supports all staff.

The connections and associations Whanganui Collegiate School is developing across the educational landscape - we are leading that charge across New Zealand and the Globe with our networks. We are a Round Square Global School and the connections this provides for our students are exceptional. The Headmaster will be presenting at the Round Square Headmasters' Symposium in the UK in January, and as a School we will be hosting a Round Square International Conference in December 2023.

The School is a member with Australian Boarding Schools' Association, and the only NZ School to be an International Affiliate of the Boarding Schools' Association - UK. These connections allow WCS to be a leader in boarding and character education and we continue to strive for our School to be the very best.

The School Board thanks the recently retired parent-elected Board members Mrs Jenny Robb and Mrs Suze Redmayne for their time and effort over the past three years. Their knowledge and enthusiasm has been significant and much appreciated. We would also like to acknowledge Mr Mathew Owen, teaching staff representative for the past three years, for his valuable contribution particularly in the regular presentations of academic results. We welcome Mrs Sara Ross, Mr Rhys McKinlay and Mrs Tash Bullock as their replacements, thank them for putting themselves forward and for their ongoing support.

A key focus for the School Board over the next year will be managing the impact of changes to NCEA proposed by the government. The Headmaster and academic team are working through these to ensure the School continues to provide a robust and challenging academic curriculum.

With demand for enrolment high, at the end of 2021 the Ministry of Education approved an increase to our domestic roll from 430 to 470 students. This increase is for boarding only. We continue to see high expressions of interest from across the country, as many parents come to appreciate the benefits of the 7-day boarding model for the development of young people.

Looking to the future, we have embarked on a concerted effort to relaunch the Capital Generation initiative, to fund the long-term, inter-generational assets of Whanganui Collegiate School. Our 111-year-old assets and grounds require constant maintenance and upgrades, to provide safe, comfortable and pleasant surroundings for our students and staff. We hope all our community will consider supporting at some level our "Now is the Time" fundraising campaign. Past generations have always supported future generations of WCS to ensure our magnificent campus is maintained to a standard consistent with expectations.

We would like to express our appreciation to current parents. We know many of you make enormous sacrifices to give your sons and daughters a quality WCS education.

We wish all our community a relaxing, refreshing and safe Christmas break with friends and family, and thank you for your ongoing support of the School.

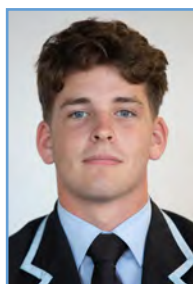

SPEECH FROM HEAD OF SCHOOL - EMILY MCKINLAY



Whanganui Collegiate School is unique; we are a 7-day co-ed boarding community consisting of staff and students with varied skills and interests who thrive off each other, and while we are small, we punch well above our weight in almost everything we do.

As we all sit here together to reflect on another exceptional year for our school and the Collegiate community, there is so much to be thankful for; we have had far less disruption and a greater sense of normality at school with Tournament Week finally taking place, our beloved winter sports festival returning and family and friends once again in attendance at Collegiate Weekends, and special occasions such as today.

My time here has been filled with many incredible experiences and many firsts. Within the first few weeks of Year 9, I had my first experience sitting in a boat on the Whanganui River. My new sport of rowing soon went from something fun to try with my mates, to my sporting passion. WCS Chapel

The Chapel has returned to a regular rhythm of prayer and worship through Chapel services on Wednesday mornings and Sunday evenings. The disruptions of COVID feel like a memory of another time, and as a result, we realised afresh that gathering as a community was important to the life and spirit of our togetherness and we were very pleased to experience School singing and common worship once again.

Our Staff Chapel team are extremely dependable, have unique skills which they offer in the Chapel services and are very supportive of me as the Chaplain. Our organist is Mr Don Colway who is an WCS Old Boy and has performed in this role for the last eight and a half years. Mr Richard Ellsworth is Head of Academic Music and helps to co-ordinate the rich, musical services that we have been able to create. He is supported by our choir master, Iain Tetley, who is a professional singer and who we all look forward to seeing performing as the main character in the Phantom of the Opera.

The theme that I proposed for the Chapel this year was '*Daring to Dream*' as I felt that students, because of the limitations of COVID, had lost the ability to imagine the bigger picture and had therefore stopped having hope in their goals for the future. I wanted to see their goals emerge while being supported by a spirituality with strong values which is part of the Christian Fellowship. It has been good to see their spirituality and longing to aspire return.

Our Chapel leader this year was **Tessa Norman** who was well supported by **Alice Barry**. We no longer have sacristans, but we have managed to create a small Chapel team that undertake some charity work for events like the World Vision 40 Hour Famine and Relay for Life.

As a team they also ministered to the School through the service they created about homelessness where they shared some of the struggles that people experience.

This year the local Relay for Life event was cancelled due to COVID which was disappointing as students had already raised almost \$30,000 online and so instead, we created an evening event at WCS where students dressed up and got into the spirit of the walk. Pastoral Care and Wellbeing

WHO named it 'COVID fatigue' and regardless of whether you've had COVID or not, I am sure there are many of us who could relate. For some of us 'mask fatigue' was also real. So, in September it was a relief to be able to have the option to remove masks in the classroom, Chapel and Big School and take some deep breaths at last. A sign of some return to normal routine.

This year our Pastoral Care teams stepped up to face COVID challenges. Our Housemasters, Heads of Year, Health and Wellbeing team, International Department and our staff were there to support our students, to help them reconnect with the full, rich and varied school life that Whanganui Collegiate School offers them. Our focus was to enable our students to shake off COVID fatigue, to regain some control in their lives, spend time with friends and whanau again, let off steam, try new experiences, learn new things and help others. 2022 was about finding our feet again and prioritising what is good in our lives. Being grateful. Checking in with each other. Being kind.

I am appreciative of the work that our **Heads of Year** have accomplished this year. With the support of Tutor teachers and Schoolbox, our Heads of Year ensured we stayed connected with our students throughout the year. The Health and Wellbeing team further developed their role within the School this year in response to the wellbeing needs of individual students, as well as attempting to address the overarching needs presented to us in our day-to-day dealings with our students as a whole. For 2022 concerns around sleep, energy, body image, social media and inclusivity were at the forefront. As a team we were able to provide resources, guest speakers, education and effective practice to respond to the hauora needs of our student cohort. A highlight for our team in



2022 was the establishment of the WCS Pride Youth group.

KOMODO – With the support of the IT team and our Blueshirts, we relaunched Komodo with great enthusiasm this year. Komodo is a digital tool we utilised to survey the wellbeing of our students every week. Students used a 1-10 sliding scale to rate their House Life, Academics, Energy, Sleep Quality and Work Life Balance. These responses were analysed in order to be proactive; initiating

interventions and confidential conversations as necessary.

Student Wellbeing Highlights

Student wellbeing was further enhanced this year with our usual Health programmes for Year 9-11. Students in Year 12 and 13 received a Hauora lesson once a week providing senior students with the tools they require as they consider possible leadership, employment, university and the transition from school to the outside world. Alongside this our special character added another dimension, further supporting the holistic approach to student wellbeing here at Whanganui Collegiate School.

Again, this year we were able to attract various outside agencies to present to our students; further enhancing their wellbeing learning. They were:

Together with our resourceful IT team we were able to provide the latest information on responding to online incidents, what to look for, what to do and seeking advice. Constable Ben Broughton supported this even further through a Cyber Safety presentation for our junior students.

Model United Nations (MUN)

The past few years have impacted on our ability to participate in Model United Nations events. Last year Olivia Simpson was accepted as a participant in the National MUN, only to have it cancelled a few days before the event. Fortunately, this year it did go ahead. Here is her account of her experience:

My experience at National MUN

This year I was incredibly fortunate to attend National Model United Nations (NZMUN) in Wellington over the July holidays. I represented the United States of America along with more than 100 other countries. We had some brilliant guest speakers such as the Honorable Phil Twyford who gave a seminar on the matter of Nuclear Weapons and how we as a country handle them. Phil will be pleased to know that he has become a niche celebrity among NZMUN Delegates, but his parting message of 'We would love to see a world without war', was particularly poignant considering the Ukraine/Russia conflict. Our committee sessions and workshops were also very interesting, ranging from international terrorism and crisis management to journalistic safety.

MUN was definitely a big change to debating and it was out of my comfort zone at first. However, I met some amazing people along the way and learnt so much. I made many memories at NZMUN this year and I hope to see even more WCS students giving it a go next year. My experience at NZMUN 2022 was wonderful and most of all I learnt that everyone can learn from it. A big thank you to Miss Michelson for helping me sort out applications and resolutions, and always being around to answer any questions in the leadup!

WCS Junior MUN 30 November

We were also able to have our annual (since 2018) WCS Junior Model United Nations event here in Big School. Over the past two years this has grown into two separate General Assemblies – one for the Year 9s and one for the Year 10s. All students were allocated a United Nations member state to represent. They worked in delegations of two or three students, based on their Houses, and prepared to participate in various ways on the day.

Every student got up to speak for their country introductions. Then different speakers came forward to debate aspects of the resolution being discussed. The resolution was about Climate Refugees – a variation on the one debated in Wellington at National MUN earlier in the year. The three main clauses included giving climate refugees official recognition as refugees; urging the development of climate-resilient, migrant-friendly cities; and asking that 0.5% of the Real GDP of each member state be set aside to deal with this issue. This covered a lot of ground in a short space of time, giving the delegates the chance to consider a range of issues and solutions.

Then, still representing the views of their country, delegates voted on the various clauses. If this were a full-day, or even a multi-day event, there would have been the opportunity for our students to make amendments to the clauses and to lobby other member states to support them. The students did an excellent job at staying in role based on their research into this issue – which led to the Year 10 Assembly rejecting two of the three

clauses, whilst the Year 9s took a more positive approach and supported every clause. In addition, the Year 9 delegations created promotional posters about their countries, while the Year 10s created their own resolutions.

I would like to thank the staff members who supported their Houses through both events on the day and nominated their best delegations for recognition. I also highly appreciated the work of Olivia Simpson and Te Amo Crow, who had volunteered earlier in the term and stayed after their NCEA exams had finished to help run this event. They worked tirelessly behind the scenes and on the stage to keep things running smoothly for the four hours, and they already have ideas about other MUN events for 2023 – so watch this space.

Source to Sea

It was wonderful to run the Source to Sea experience after the disappointment of 2021, when floods cancelled the journey midway through the first day. A group of 22 was selected early in Term 3 and planning and training began immediately thereafter.



On Saturday 3 December the group reported to the Mangatepopo School Camp. All were excited and many were nervous. **Jack McCarthy and Jess Yates**, the elected leaders, filled the Source to Sea flask with water from headwaters of the

Whanganui River; water that they would carry through the journey and pour into the Tasman Sea on completion of the experience.



Shortly after midnight, we rose for an early breakfast after which the students set off on the Night Navigation exercise led by **Jaden Allen and Jess Yates**. On a cloudless night with temperatures close to zero

degrees, they used the map to good effect and but for a few mistakes, guided their peers along narrow pathways, forest roads and through thick bush reaching the assembly point by 6.00am.

After a second breakfast we then set off for the 85km cycle to Whakahoro. Sadly our normal route along the 42 Traverse had been closed earlier in the week due to a slip, and we therefore diverted along SH47 to National Park and then down Fishers Track. It was a cloudless day but not too hot and cycling conditions were as good as we could have hoped for. The last 30km was tough but they showed resolve and we rolled into the DOC Campsite at Whakahoro by 3.00pm.

On Monday morning the group were on the river in good time and the next two-and-a-half days were spent paddling for overnight stays at John Coull Hut and Tieke Marae. The group made a customary visit to the Bridge to Nowhere.



Only on the last rapid before reaching Pipiriki did a kayak capsize and Mrs Abraham was drenched as they paddled the final kilometre.

In Pipiriki the group was reunited with their bicycles for the cycle to the Thurlow Farm



near Atene. Conditions were again perfect for cycling and we held our first King of the Mountain races. **Toby Craig** was first to the summit of Welcome Back Hill, followed by **Jaden Allen**. **Jess Yates** won the girls' race followed by **Poppy Hobbs**. We rolled into the

Furthermore, newcomer **Olivia Simpson** was named 'Most Promising Speaker', **John Bryant** awarded 'Best Speaker' and all three were named in the regional squad to compete at Nationals. It was a superb win for WCS who managed to go back-to-back and wire-to-wire in the most important event of the year.

In other Inter-School events it was pleasing to see the return of the John Prestage Junior Competition and the MSDC Championship. As each competition found its feet post-COVID,

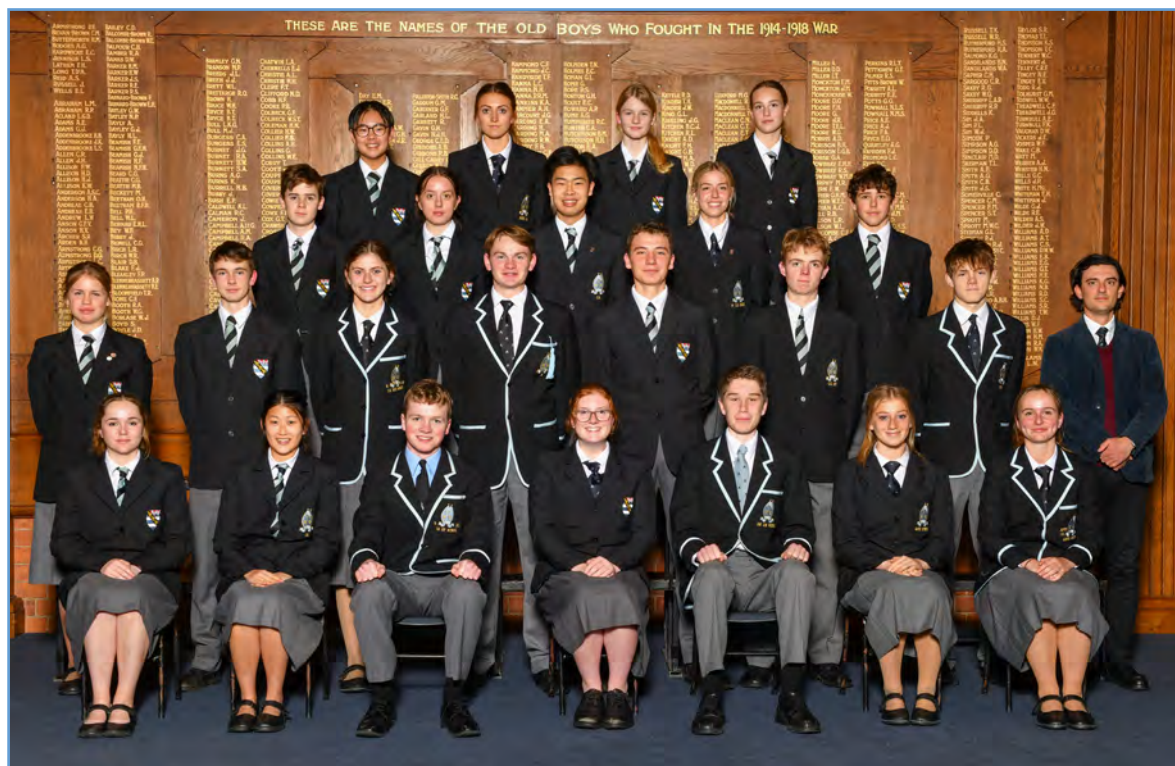

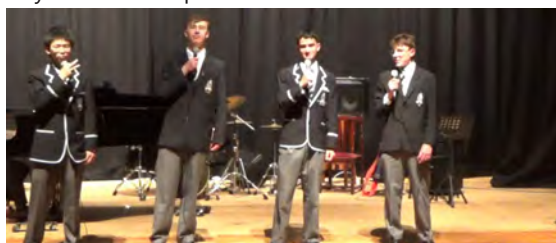

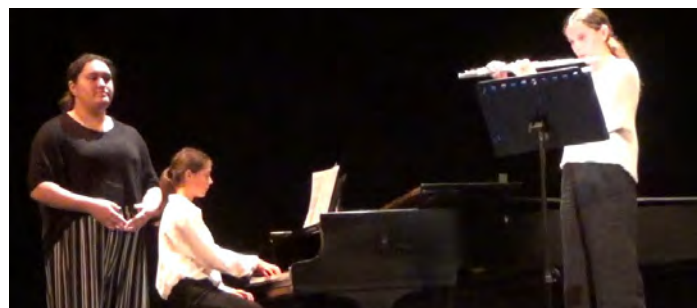

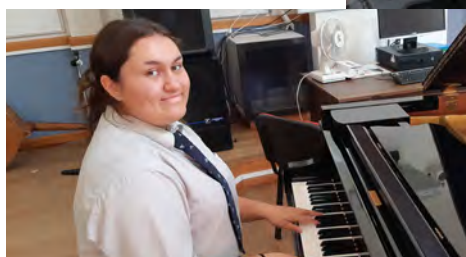

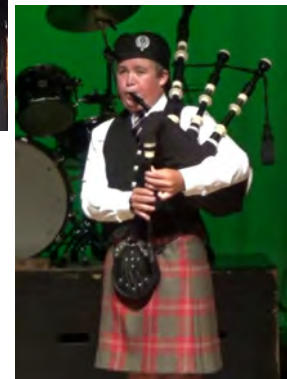

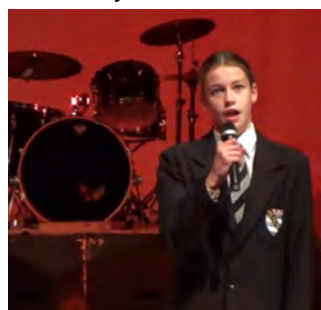

This is my 50th and final annual report on Athletics and Cross Country for the Collegian and I can't resist a look back before reviewing 2022.

I was fortunate on arrival at Whanganui Collegiate School that my enthusiasm for the sport was well supported by the Headmaster, the late Tom Wells and Senior Staff including the late Jim Wallace, Murray Davis and Peter Irvine.

Official Athletics, as it was named then, attracted just twelve athletes although it was accepted that at the Inter-Schools they would be supported by a wide range of students from other sports. My starting year coincided with the first New Zealand Secondary Schools Athletics Championships held in Christchurch in December 1973. The fact that it was to be held at Queen Elizabeth II Stadium as a trial for systems for the 1974 Commonwealth Games at the end of the following month attracted a team of some thirty athletes. I quickly recognised that there was more enthusiasm than talent in that group. I thought, with work, we might produce a solid 4 x 400 Relay Team and with a sound 800m runner David Clarke, a top Tennis player David Glasson, a 1st XI Cricketer Jonathon



Fairclough and 5th Form (Year 11) Cricketer Gil Barnitt, combined to win our only medal at the Championship (bronze). It is a special pleasure to see Mr Barnitt at the helm 50 years later. He was also my first winner of a Whanganui Schools title in April of that year with a win in the Intermediate Boys 800m.

The following year we did not win a medal at the Championships (the only year we have not won one). We did manage 4th in the 4 x 400 Relay and there was a genuine rise in standard and the start of growth in those taking athletics. The Relay successes became a vital part of that success and in the long list of achievers, listed at the back of the Athletics Programme, Relays are listed 200 times amongst medal winners at major Championships. This sits alongside a long list of title winners and New Zealand Schools Internationals. **Daniel Natusch** still holds the New Zealand Schools Senior Triple Jump Record set in 2005 and the WCS still holds the Junior Girls 4 x 100 and 4 x 400 records, having held four previous Relay records.

I also reflected as the rain poured down in Inglewood over Friday and Saturday that things were a little different the last time the event was held there and like twenty years earlier, the rain cleared during Sunday revealing the majestic Mount Taranaki. Each Championship brings back memories of not just the event, but the team dynamic often built during travel, none more so than in 2003 when, with plenty of time on our hands, we travelled to Invercargill by bus returning via Queenstown for two nights - an eight-day adventure. That 2003 Team was highly successful with many medals including four gold medals from **Daniel Natusch** and the start of the road to success for the **van Dalen** twins with **Lucy** running in an Olympics Semi-Final just nine years later.

The 2022 year was like no other year as the effects of the pandemic became more prominent in our lives. There had been no New Zealand Schools in the previous December and the North Island Schools were cancelled. The Athletics New Zealand Championships were only open to vaccinated athletes and held in age group bubbles with strict COVID protocols. The Whanganui Schools was also held in event discipline bubbles but was the first Meet to allow unvaccinated athletes to compete. The popular Porritt Classic in Hamilton with its attractive school support events was cancelled, leaving few competitive opportunities for individuals and none for relay teams.

The Inter-House competition was run without parents attending on the Golf Course, utilising the St George's 200m track and surrounding area for the teams' races. This alternative innovative Meet, a mix of Indoor Athletics, Highland Gathering and traditional events was blessed with glorious weather and a vibrant and exciting afternoon. Grey retained the Inter-House Shield.

A small group of fully vaccinated athletes attended the Athletics New Zealand Championships in Hastings.

The Whanganui Secondary Schools were held over four sessions without relays and utilised two consecutive Tuesday evenings to keep within COVID protocols, there were no Relays.

Podium places were largely shared with Whanganui High School who were particularly strong in sprints. We just shaded our neighbours in titles but they were ahead of us in total places. It is important that we have strong neighbours for the development of our sport. Some of the usual combinations were not possible because of the COVID protocols. **Juliet McKinlay** shone in the Junior Girls with six titles and **Parlay Clarke** in the Junior Boys with three. Captain **Jacky Dai** took three senior titles including a surprise win in the 200m. The distance runners **Louise Brabyn**, **Toby Caro**, **Amy McHardy**, **James Hercus**, **Daniel Sinclair** shared middle distance titles including some outstanding performances. Sadly, with no North Island Schools, this became the last major event of the truncated season. **Daniel Sinclair** and **Louise Brabyn** however excelled in a special School race at the end of the final Club Night, where they both set personal bests for 1500m (3:58.71 and 4:37.49 respectively) with five others setting bests in the strong field.

CROSS COUNTRY

The winter term saw the return of some events which had been cancelled in 2021. We returned to the Wellington Karori Relays, the Inter-House Relay returned and in September the Round the Lake Relay and the Inter-House Indoor Athletics was held after a two-year gap.

The Karori Relays, as in the past, clashed with some traditional Inter-School fixtures. We were able to field a girls' team as the Girl's Hockey match with Scots College finished in time for **Louise Brabyn**, **Amy McHardy** and **Greta Darke** time to dash across the city from Mt Albert Park to Karori Park just in time for the race, and with a team of two juniors and two seniors, did well to finish third. The strong boys' team of **Daniel Sinclair**, **Toby Caro**, **Elliot Jones**, **Lucas Martin**, **Matthew Sinclair** and **James Hercus** produced the first ever win in the Senior Boys with a great early season team effort.

The Whanganui Secondary Schools were run as Relays on a very wet Tawhero Golf course circuit with prominent WCS performances. The individual championships were held at Victoria Park, a course that had some similarities to Saxon Field, Nelson where the New Zealand Schools were to be held. Fields were small but our athletes had a serious workout.

Term 4

The final term leading up to the New Zealand Schools Track and Field and Road Race provides challenges and this year was no exception. As there had been no New Zealand Schools Championships since 2021, it meant that the final team had a large group of students who have never been to a Schools Championships and were therefore not only inexperienced at this kind of competition, but also in terms of training expectations.



The team was also weakened by injury prior to the Championships, **Bella Willis** and **Daniel Sinclair** during the event and the non-availability of **Samuel Hermann**, **Israel Calkin** and **Teniva Guinea** (overseas travel) and Captain **Josephine Perkins** (Spirit of Adventure).

Prize Giving again clashed with the first of three Regional Meetings and left some athletes short of build up competition. However, the many personal bests at both Club Nights and the Regional Meets at both Palmerston North and Masterton demonstrated steady progress, but leaving the question of whether this was enough unanswered until the event itself.

The team of 2022 provided some wonderful results and confirmed to many that my belief in them was well founded. Lack of self-belief, particularly amongst the less experienced is a real barrier for many.

The team of 28 produced 16 personal bests from 13 different athletes and two selected for the Championship Team (**Lucas Martin** and **Louise Brabyn**), garnered three individual medals (one gold **Louise Brabyn** 2000m Steeplechase, two silvers **Juliet McKinlay** and **Lucas Martin**, one School and Centre Record (**Lucas Martin** 2000m Walk, which also was the third fastest in the 49-year history of the event). They also won three team medals, silver in the 3 to score Road Race and bronzes in the Junior Boys 4 x 400 and Mixed 4 x 400 metres. The team had five fourth places, one fifth, two sixths and three seventh places - very pleasing from an inexperienced team. **Lucas Martin** retained his Athletics New Zealand U20 10km Road Walk Championship.

Next up was St Patrick's College Silverstream and WCS took control early with another strong run from **William Johnston** giving him his second try, quickly followed by another from **Monty Sherriff** and a third added by **Pita Manamanaivalu**, two of which were converted, to be leading 19–0 at half time. St Pat's hit back with a couple of tries in the second half but WCS held on to win 19–12.

The third game was against the Sir Gordon Tietjens 7s champions Palmerston North BHS. **Josh Brunger** ran strongly and beat several tacklers to score two first half tries, both converted by **Pita Manamanaivalu**, but PNBHS were equally good on attack and scored three tries with only one converted to lead 14–17 at half time. In the second half a try to **Judah Saumaisue** and a third to **Josh Brunger** both converted by **Pita Manamanaivalu** were

answered by two to PNBHS with only one converted meaning the narrowest of losses by 28–29.

To make the final WCS had to beat Scots College. A fantastic start saw **William Johnston** go straight through the middle off the first possession to score under the posts. Then a try from hardworking **Harvey Meyer** was followed by tries to **Pita Manamanaivalu** and **Monty Sherriff**, with three converted by **Manamanaivalu** to lead 26–0 at half time. Good defence held out St Bede's and then just before half time good play was finished off with a try to **Judah Saumaisue** to lead 10–0 at the break. St Bede's started the second half well and got over for a try but a good lineout steal from **Hunter Gibson** led to a try from **Monty Sherriff** converted by **Pita Manamanaivalu**. Then a well-deserved try to **Josh Brunger** sealed the victory 22–5.

Next up was De La Salle who finished fourth the Auckland 1A in 2022 and made the semi-finals of the last Condor 7s in 2020. De La Salle applied early pressure and forced WCS into several errors and scored three unanswered first half tries with one converted to lead 0–17 at half time. The second half continued in much the same way with another three tries to DLS all converted. Final score 0–38.

The third game was against traditional Quad rivals Nelson College. WCS played with more composure this time and moved the ball well for **Pita Manamanaivalu** to break away to open the scoring and also to knock over the conversion. **Josh Brunger** then scored his second of the day to extend the score to 12–0 at half time. This meant after round robin play we had a ranking of 14 and in the Plate Competition (9th-16th) for our Sunday matches. Additionally, WCS entered four relay teams into various events with our teams, and despite being relative newcomers to team swimming and having to swim in higher age groups given our small team size, they performed meritoriously alongside much older swimmers.

West Coast Swimming Championships

Attracting swimmers from the Whanganui, Manawatu and Wellington regions, Whanganui Collegiate School had six swimmers representing the Whanganui Swimming Club, achieving a total medal haul of 26 – 13 gold, nine silver and four bronze in their first meet of the season.

In the Girls 16 and over section, **Georgia Abraham** won gold in each of her six races, while newcomer to Whanganui Collegiate School, 14 year old **Blake Candish** won three gold medals and two silver medals from five starts. 14 year-olds **Sophie Young-Wilson** (two gold and three silver) and **Eli Abraham** (two gold, one silver and two bronze) also performed impressively at the meet, as did twins **Keanu and Kaya Marshall**, with three silver and two bronze medals, respectively.

This year, **Georgia Abraham** was awarded a Recognition of Age Group Excellence award by Swimming Manawatu, recognising her as the top 16 year old and over swimmer in the region. Her year culminated in her winning the Johnston Trophy for Commitment to Swimming Excellence at the 2022 Senior School Prize Giving.

We congratulate all of our swimmers on a successful swimming season in 2022 and our School coaches, **Mr Peter Preston, Mr Henry Jones and Mrs Olivia Wright** for their work with our group of around 40 swimmers. We look forward to the 2023 season.

New Plymouth Girls' High School - Away game with the top six girls. The most competitive we have been against NPGHS in a number of years. **Francesca Lyons** and **Olive Tahau** played much higher ranked girls and were beaten, **Anipatu Tauhara** and **Pathamon Permhol** had easy wins and **Charlotte White** and **Tabatha Smith** battled, but ended up losing close games.

Lindisfarne Tournament - Top five juniors competed at Lindisfarne, beating the Lindisfarne B, but just missing out against their A side and FAHS.

Feilding High School - Home game against Feilding going down 22-18. We were not able to play our top 4 players as their ranking was too high for Feilding, so a good result. The fixture included 40 matches, each player playing at least three games.

CD Tournament - Four even WCS Squads competed in four separate exchanges with Feilding High School, Paraparaumu College and Whanganui Club team. Out of the eight squads, our teams came 2nd, 4th, 5th and 8th. Not bad considering five top players were out due to illness. A great experience with four matches played per day. Club Champs - Competed round robin matches on Sundays with a finals day. HOUSE WINTER SPORTS FESTIVAL

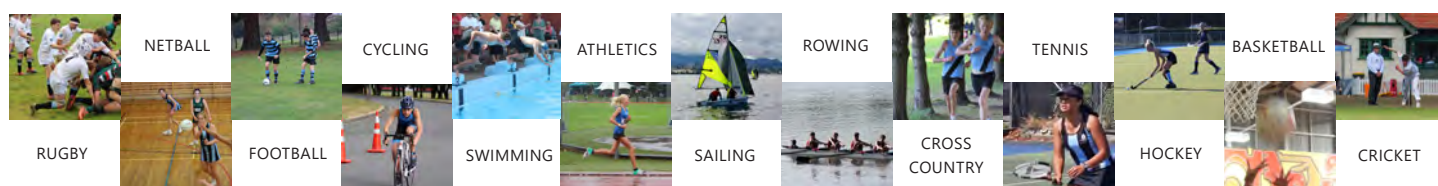

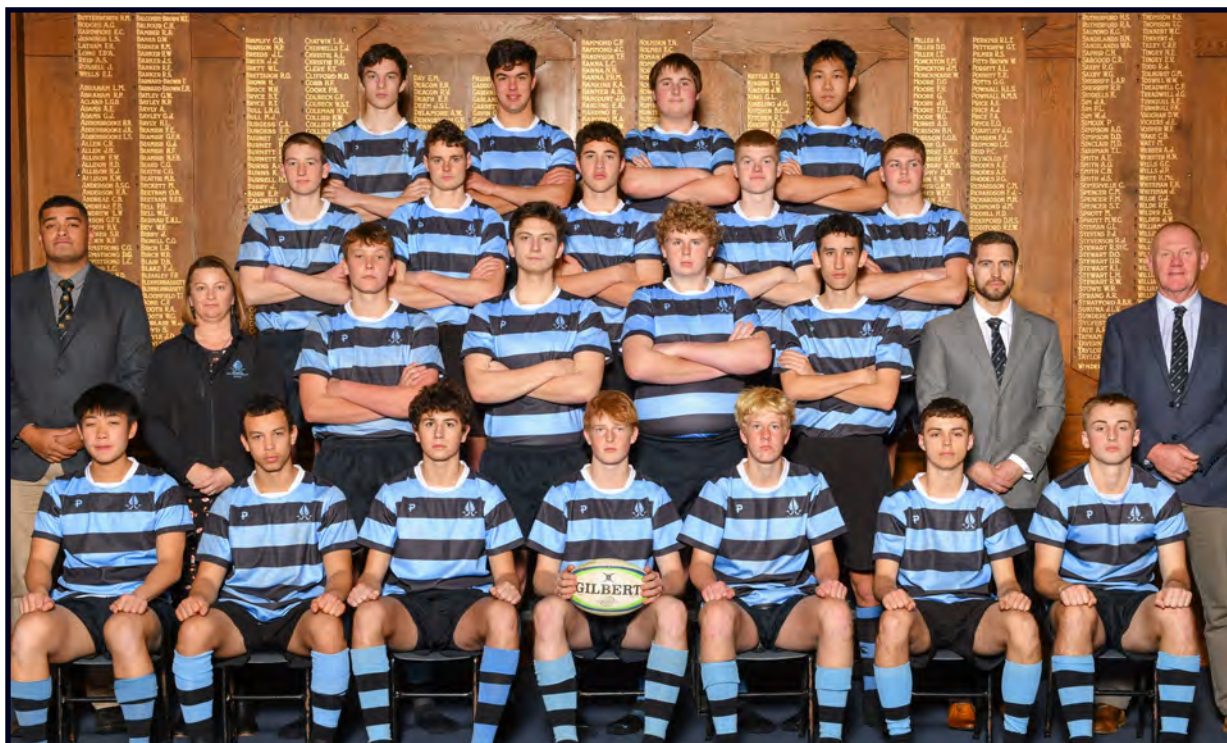

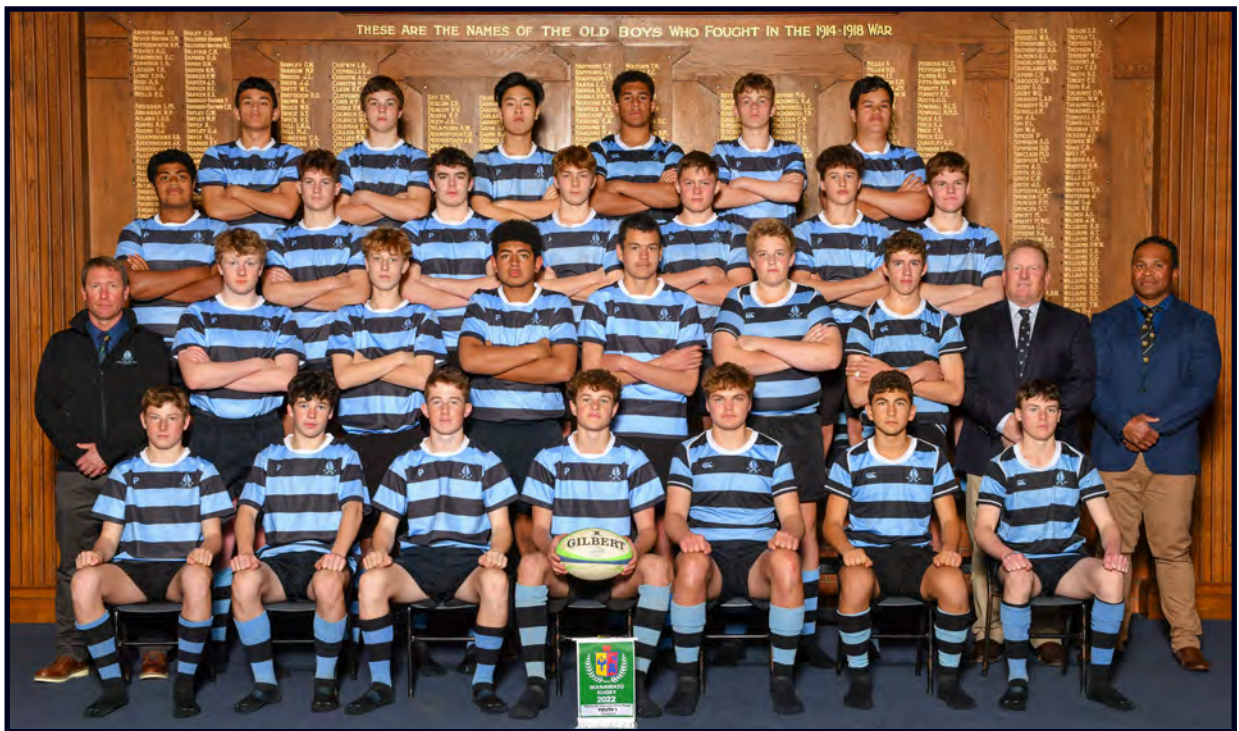

next year, 2023 looks to be a promising year for our Senior Debaters.

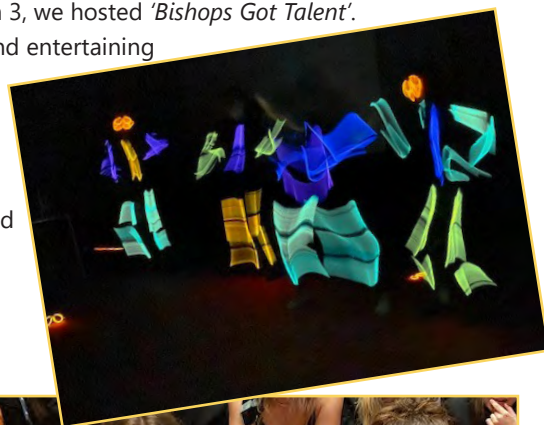
